Earth Hour isn't just for big cities, anyone can participate. To get a better sense of the event, log on to www.youtube.com and search for Earth Hour 2009 Movie.



"The Facts" About Fraud and Abuse in Maine's Welfare System Rep. Linda Sanborn

hen I was campaigning, many constituents expressed concern about fraud and abuse in Maine's welfare system. Speaking with other candidates, I found I was not alone.

As a new member of the Legislature's Committee on Health and Human Services, I have more data at my fingertips. The primary program most people are referring to as welfare is called Temporary Assistance to Needy Families or TANEAs it turns out, Maine is doing a very good job administering this federal program. The Department of Health and Human Services has provided the committee with information that I thought might be helpful to bust a few of these common myths:

- 1) Myth: People are moving into Maine because of its rich benefits. Reality: Maine has the lowest TANF benefit in New England. Over the last five years, more than five times as many people on welfare left Maine than moved in.
- 2) Myth: TANF benefits are so high, they discourage people from working.

Reality: The maximum benefit for a family of three is \$485 per month, 65 percent below the federal poverty level. Even when food stamps are added, TANF families are 35 percent below the federal poverty level.

3) Myth: There are no time limits for eligibility.

Reality: Eligibility is reviewed monthly and there are limits. A person must comply with their plan to move to self-sufficiency to receive benefits. More than 70 percent of the TANF recipients receive the benefit for one year or less.

- 4) Myth: There is a lot of fraud in Maine's welfare system. Reality:Maine's documented rate of fraud in the TANF Program is .05 or half of one percent. The average rate of fraud nationwide is 4 percent.
- 5) Myth: People could just get a real job! **Reality:** Maine has the highest rate of working TANF recipients in New England and is fifth in the nation in retaining TANF jobs.
- 6) Myth: People on Food Stamps use the EBT card to buy alcohol and tobacco products. Reality:Federal law prohibits Food

Stamps to be used for anything but food. Even toothpaste is not allowed. 7) Myth: People on Food

Stamps fill

their carts with junk food. **Reality:**The federal government establishes what food can be purchased. Research shows there is no difference in the type of food purchased by Food Stamp recipients and all other consumers.

- 8) Myth:People are working and getting disability checks.
 - Reality:Our program supports and encourages people returning to the workforce if able. Federal law allows people with disabilities to keep benefits during a transitional period.
- 9) Myth: People who are not legal citizens get all sorts of benefits. Reality: They don't. The Deficit Reduction Act requires a person to prove Maine residency and be a U.S. citizen or a legal immigrant to get benefits.
- 10) Myth:All sorts of immigrants are being shipped to Maine to take advantage of our welfare system and we are working to support them. Reality: Maine has been receiving an average of 100-125 primary refugees each year and therefore receives \$1.5 to 2 million directly from the Federal Office of Refugee Resettlement for initial resettlement and capacity building services. Because Maine's population is growing slower than the rest of the nation and is older, as the baby boomers retire we have a large projected employee gap. Fortunately, Maine has begun to attract an immigrant population of young residents, eager to participate in work and civic life, ready to build lives in Maine and contribute to the economic future.

Finally, there has been much discussion surrounding a desire to limit access to MaineCare for state residents until they have lived in Maine for a certain period of time. The Supreme Court reaffirms that we are citizens of the United States, while we are only resi-

CARSON LYNCH The Gorham Grind Owner and True Community Member Dede Perkins

Grind and an involved community member, first came to Maine in 1990 when he was fresh out of high school. Except for a brief stint in Boston, Lynch has been here ever since.

For his first eight years in Portland, Lynch worked in the commercial fishing industry. In 1998, he accepted a job in sales and marketing with Fresh Samantha Juice Company. "I consider my experience at Fresh Samantha as my business degree," Lynch said. In 1999, he helped take the show on the road. "We had a 25-foot Winnebago covered in fruit, towing a giant juice bottle on a trailer and sampling Fresh Samantha up and down the east coast."

In 2000, Fresh Samantha sent Lynch to Boston to run the company's regional marketing team. Lynch stayed on even after Odwalla bought the company. "I learned more about food and food service. I honed my customer service skills," he said. "On Earth Day, there were 125,000 people at the Esplanade in Boston. We gave away free Odwalla juice all day."

While at Odwalla, Lynch ran sampling programs at Whole Foods, Trader Joes, and college campuses. During this time, Lynch realized he related to the natural and holistic culture that cared less about marketing and more about product. "You can never compromise quality," he said.

Lynch began to think about a business of his own. He imagined a classic coffee house, a place of intelligent conversation, philosophy, music, and relaxation. Lynch cashed out his 401k, quit his job and decided to follow his vision. Three years (and six rounds of location due diligence) later, he was prepared to pack it in and return to corporate life. However, when he heard from a friend that The Gorham Grind was for sale, everything fell into place. Lynch quickly came to terms with the coffeehouse's original owners, Joe Baker and Sarah Littlefield, his first day at the Grind was December 23, 2005.

Since coming to Gorham, Lynch has become involved the community. "Gorham cares about local. This town has so much to offer: energy, creativity, a great work ethic."

Besides exhibiting a rotating collection of art at the Grind, Lynch was one

of the founders of Gorham Art Fair. This free, public art show and sale happens every October, and has enjoyed a positive response from Gorham residents. "Many artists lack self-confidence. I spend my time trying to encourage these folks to share their work with the community," he said. "The Gorham Art Fair was an idea that was realized with the help of Jeremy and Sabrina Greene at The Art Guru and many other dedicated volunteers. We all embraced the fact that we have a core of amazing artists and craftspeople in this town. We wanted to show their talent."

Lynch was also a key participant in last summer's inaugural Tastewalk. "We served Gifford's Cake Batter ice cream and mocha freezes and were delighted with the result. Over 240 people came through in two hours."

The Vice-President of the Gorham Business and Civic Exchange, Lynch is a vocal proponent to create a pedestrian-friendly, community-oriented, probusiness Gorham Village.

When asked about his plans for the future, Lynch replied, "I want to stay right where I am. I hope to buy the building eventually. I plan to keep doing what works, offering a community space, and serving the highest quality coffee at the best price. We'll get into roasting because besides making business sense, that's where the magic happens."

Gorham will join the Cumberland County Sheriff's Office Volunteer In Police Service (VIPS) Ginny O'Keefe

The VIPS are a group of like minded citizens of all ages, both men and women, who have joined together to help augment the local Sheriff's Office and Police Departments in this time of cut backs and staff shortages. The aim of the VIPS is to take away the more minor, though still important tasks of police work, thereby allowing police officers and deputies to go where their skills and training are most needed.

The VIPS is a national program. The Cumberland County Sheriffs Office (CCSO) VIPS chapter started in Standish in January 2008 under the auspice of the CCSO and is overseen by Deputy Paul Pettengill and program co-coordinator Janet Biczak. Volunteers, once accepted, train for 3 hours once a week in most aspects of police work from evidence preservation, traffic control, patrolling, safety and property checks to senior checks and CHIPS (child identification program). There is definitely something of interest for everyone as this is a fast growing and much needed group.

This program has been such a great success for Standish and the Cumberland County Sheriff's Office that other local police departments, seeing the benefits of the VIPS, want to have volunteers for their towns too.

Gorham police Chief Ron Shepard was the first to see the benefit of this program and is eager to have his town and community join in. He would like to encourage anyone interested (over the age of 18 years) to attend the Gorham Marketplace on March 28 where there will be a VIPS booth.

isa King, of Kings Farm Market, addressed the Planning Board Monday evening, requesting approval for construction of a metal pole barn and attached deck, to be located at the corner of County Road and Burnham Road.

King explained specifics around the proposed structures, which would replace two existing greenhouses. The barn would span approximately 60'x100', with an adjacent 40'x100' deck. The applicant answered initial concern from the board regarding traffic issues, clarifying, "We're not trying to garner new customers; we're just looking to accommodate our current ones."

Neighbors of the property voiced their concerns, seeking reassurance that environmental protection was viewed a priority. Hans Hansen of 74 County Road took particular interest in ground water preservation, stating, "We need written confirmation from the DEP that this site is safe to build on." He suggested having an expert in the field closely examine the current ground water condition in order to "prevent the entire area from contamination ten years down the road."

Board member Douglas Boyce agreed that evidence of ground water quality should be presented, and also requested that the location and construction of all wells be clearly noted on the site plan.

Abutting neighbor, Paulette Brime, addressed the board with her hesitations. Ms. Brime requested that the property survey be updated and that the board consider requiring a fence be constructed.

Upon hearing concerns from the public and discussing the proposal, the board ruled to postpone continuation of the public hearing to a future date, yet to be determined.

Local Officials Attend Transportation Meeting Bill Ambrose

n Feb. 24, Town Manager David Cole and Town Councilor Burleigh Loveitt attended the first Steering Committee Meeting of the Gorham Corridor Study conducted by the Maine Turnpike Authority. The committee is comprised of representatives of the four communities directly impacted by the study's findings, Gorham, Westbrook, Scarborough, and South Portland. The MTA, along with Maine's Department of Transportation, are seeking long-term solutions to the traffic woes of the region. In reporting to the Town Council at the March 3 meeting, Loveitt termed the transportation meeting "a very interesting event." He believed that the study would provide the groundwork for a Turnpike spur and other types of transportation change west of Gorham. The two-year study could yield recommendations ranging from doing nothing to "light rail, bicycles, snow treads, and perhaps also a roadway."The next meeting of the steering committee is scheduled for March 31.

CARTER'S CAR CARE Ethanol Questions Doug Carter

here has been a lot of talk lately about ethanol. The good points are easy. Ethanol may help reduce U.S. reliance on oil imports and produce a moderate reduction in emissions of greenhouse gasses. Ethanol is a good oxygenater. It adds extra oxygen to the combustion gasses, helping the catalytic converter to completely burn all the fuel, thus lowering a car's emissions. The other chemical that is used for this purpose, MtBE, is a carcinogen that is very bad for the environment if it seeps into the ground from leaking underground storage tanks.

That takes care of the good points of ethanol. Now for the down side. Ethanol is a hydroscopic fluid, meaning it absorbs water. Gasoline and water do not mix. If any water is added to the fuel, it will separate the ethanol from the gasoline (phase separation) and layer the fuel sitting in your car's gas tank. If the quantities are large enough they can cause unusual driving conditions in your car.Adding dry gas won't help because ethanol basically is dry gas. There are fuel treatments on the market that are designed to work with the ethanol and prevent phase separation.

Because ethanol has high concentrations of oxygen, it is very corrosive, so corrosive that it is shipped separately and then mixed with gasoline at the last point of distribution. Flex fuel cars capable of burning E85 fuel (85% ethanol) are constructed with high grade stainless steel parts for the fuel system and other expensive components to prevent corrosion.

Also, ethanol's flash point is higher at low temperatures than gasoline making it harder to start a cold engine. This is why northern states don't have the high concentrations of ethanol that the southern states have. Nearly all gasoline now distributed in Maine contains 10% ethanol.

The biggest problem with ethanol is the return on investment. The energy it takes to plant corn, irrigate, harvest, process, ferment and distribute it consumes more energy than the ethanol will produce. There are 76,000 BTU's

per gallon of ethanol and there are 124,800 BTU's in a gallon of gasoline and 140,000 BTU's in diesel. This is why ethanol is not used to run the farm equipment used to harvest the corn. This is also why the gas mileage in your car has dropped. It takes about 1.56 gallons of ethanol to drive the same distance as one gallon of gasoline.

Right now, ethanol is costly. Federal and state subsidies of approximately \$1 billion a year for the production of ethanol are needed to help keep it competitive with petroleum. An acre of corn will produce 328 gallons of ethanol. The United State burned over 130,000,000,000 gallons of gas last year. To produce this much ethanol, 97% of the land in the U.S. would have to grow corn.

I'll be the first person to say that we must reduce our addiction to oil. Adding some ethanol may help until something better is available. But let's not blindly subsidize the corn industry when there are other nonfood products, such as switchgrass, limbs from logging operations and other cellulosic sources that can produce ethanol without driving up the cost of food, from beef to soft drinks. So far, cellulosic ethanol costs about 50 percent more than corn-based ethanol-about \$6.04 per gallon of gasoline equivalent, so any kind of ethanol has a long way to go before becoming cost effective in the U.S.

Just like hybrids, ethanol is not the light at the end of the tunnel, but rather something that will assist us until hydrogen or something similar is developed to feed our massive appetite for energy.



The wireless network at GHS was brought in to support the needs arising in part from the efforts of the Maine Learning Technology Initiative (MLTI) which provides every middle school student with a laptop computer. Wireless became priority number one." The new network supports activities ranging from students accessing the Internet to teachers doing student assessments, building schedules and taking attendance.






the regular zoning provisions. For instance, if a builder could place ten houses on a site under the older zoning requirement, the new ordinance might allow for 16 houses. This would yield six "bonus units." The builder would pay a fee (\$15,000 per unit) to the Town, which would use the accumulated funds to purchase land or development rights in outlying portions of the Town.

As a priority, the lands purchased by the Town in the rural areas will include land adjacent to existing Town land, land along waterways, agricultural land and lands with historic or scenic value. Lands purchased with these fees would be permanently preserved for recreation or open space.

One of the purposes of the Development Transfer Overlay District is to discourage the building of suburban "sprawl" subdivisions in the rural portions of the Town. Development in the Overlay District must be in areas served by public water and sewerage, thus enabling the use of much smaller house lots. If a builder chooses to develop a subdivision under the provisions of the Overlay District, the Planning Board will enforce a stringent set of detailed standards on such things as setbacks, roadway and sidewalk design, house configuration and open space requirements. These standards will provide the basis of a walkable, pedestrian friendly neigh-






