

DEP Approves Phase I of Chick Property Sue Dunn

he Town of Gorham recently received approval for a site permit from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) for the Chick Property where the current Public Safety Building and Narragansett School are located. This approved permit included an After the Fact Permit covering the Narragansett School, along with existing parking facilities, the Public Safety Building (the old Municipal Center) and the recreation facilities (behind Narragansett School). In addition Phase 1 of the Chick property Master Plan included approval for a future connector road from Route 25 to Rt. 202, along with additional parking and a storm water pond at the current Public Safety Building.

In January 2007 it was discovered there was no permit on record with the DEP for the Narragansett School, Rec. fields and existing Public Safety building."When the buildings were under construction back in 1977 and 1978, the DEP was also in the midst of significantly changing laws regarding new construction," explained David Cole, Town Manager." Most likely it was a simple oversight since so many things were happening at the state level and here in Gorham at one time." An "After the Fact Permit" was granted to the Town for these facilities.

In keeping with the master plan to establish a better road network for public safety, the permit also includes a connector road that would provide access from the current Public Safety Building (Route 25) to the Gray Road (Route 202). Even though the site permit has been obtained, there are no actual plans to begin construction at this time.

Wagner Farm Subdivision Construction

onstruction is well underway for the Wagner Farm subdivision, a new 42-unit residential development on Libby Avenue, spanning over twenty acres. Risbara Bros.

Construction broke ground on June 1, and they aim to have the site paved by late October.


The subdivision requires blasting and crushing; both processes a raised initial concern for residents of neighboring Gateway Commons.

To address neighborhood concerns surrounding the blasting process, Risbara Bros. brought in the safety officer at Maine Drilling & Blasting to install additional seismographs where needed. Risbara Bros. also worked to accommodate residents in regards to notification of the blastings, including an extra worker at the intersection of Gateway and Timber Ridge to sound the horn prior to blasting. The construction company also agreed to provide residents, who requested, a phone call prior to blasting.

Concerns around the crushing process were also promptly attended

to. Bill Risbara, of Risbara Bros. Construction, confirmed that the crushing operation experienced an unfortunate malfunction of its dust control on July 13. Rick Heenan, President of Gateway Commons Homeowners Association, informed Risbara that many of the neighbors on Timber Ridge were upset because their homes had been coated with dust from the crushing.

Risbara Bros. addressed the problem immediately."I visited several of the neighbors and viewed their properties;

Construction Booming in Gorham Bill Ambrose

n spite of the current economic climate, there is a recent boom in construction in town. Several large projects are moving through the approval process, and two are presently underway.

Risbara Bros. Construction Co. Inc. is doing extensive site work on their Wagner Farm subdivision off Libby Avenue. Out of a total of 42 home sites, five have already been sold, and seven more are under contract. This 20-acre parcel is being developed under a new zoning ordinance that encourages more dense, village-like housing in certain areas of the town.

At the intersection of South Street and County Road in South Gorham, work has begun to transform the former Hansen's Farm Market into a Mercy Hospital Quick Care medical facility. Developer Bateman Partners, Inc. and contractor Allied-Cook expect to complete the entire project between October and November of this year.

priority for the Cumberland County Legislative Delegation has been to improve the economic development opportunities in our area and one of the best tools to entice businesses to set up shop in your town are the benefits available to a designated Pine Tree Zone. Pine Tree Zone designations have not been available throughout Cumberland County; but at the end of this past Legislative Session, an extremely important bill was passed that will change that come this September.

LD 1473, "An Act to Reaffirm Maine's Commitment to Business by Amending the Pine Tree Development Zone Laws," expands Pine Tree Zones to include all Maine municipalities. The program has been divided into two tiers, with Tier 2 locations receiving five years of benefits, while Tier 1 locations receive 10 years of benefits.

Pine Tree Zones were established in 2003 to draw businesses to areas of high unemployment, which has primarily been rural Maine. These Zones are intended to assist companies with fewer than 500 employees by providcame with, and started running.

We live in Wilton, Maine and it will take a couple hours to get there to retrieve her but we greatly desire her return.

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ing benefits such as a 100 percent income and cor-

porate tax credit for the first five years and 50 percent for the next five years. Additionally, an 80 percent refund of employee withholding taxes, a sales tax exemption and access to reduced utility rates are also extended. However, these benefits are available only if a company creates new jobs or makes new investments.

Studies show that jobs created through Pine Tree Zones often have higher salaries and benefits. According to the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development, at the end of 2008 there were 213 Pine Tree Zone certified businesses in Maine who reported plans to create more than 6,500 jobs and invest \$685 million. Those jobs are expected to generate \$203 million in payroll.

In these tough economic times, this new measure gives Maine the competitive edge needed to attract new businesses and increase jobs. As of the end of May statewide unemployment is at 8.3 percent. An influx of new jobs

Cassandra Sturdivant explains in her review that the first time she saw Blood Brothers in London's West End as an exchange student, the experience was magical."I remember laughing and crying all by myself in this huge theater full of people, I wanted to talk with someone, anyone, about how beautiful and yet also how unusual this show is. Is it a comedy or a tragedy? A standard musical or a rock musical? Uplifting or sad? A parable on class and poverty or a truly great story about love and the human spirit? The truth is, it is all of these things... and more."

Blood Brothers opens with the narrator unfolding the entire tragic story beginning to end. The next number moves quickly into an up-tempo yet gripping "Marilyn Monroe," a song about how the twin's mother found herself a single parent of eight children. However, it is the song "On Easy Terms" where Mrs. Johnstone laments needing to separate the twins, that the full force of the show hits the audience. Its hard to describe how gorgeous this musical is nor how compelling. It brings up basic questions about our society, nature versus nurture, how our wealthiest class treats our working class and how some circumstances lead to inevitable ends, when second-chances are not given and when all we need is taken away. But it also tells the story of love, of boy meets girl, or happiness being taken from simple pleasures, like a true, strong friendship that nothing can break apart. 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

Home Delivery Service

Patrons who are homebound and cannot get to the Baxter Library can have books delivered to them at home. This service has been in place for five years and is available to both people in their homes, as well as in residential housing. Currently 16 people receive home delivery and many more have benefited in the past.

Patrons choose how often deliveries occur and provide information on the number and type of books/audio materials that they prefer.Volunteers select the books and provide delivery.

Mary Ellen Valentine, an original patron of the service, receives books every two weeks. She finds the selections "thoughtful" and is appreciative of this "great program." She enjoys her conversations with the delivery person commenting that it's "nice to have an opportunity to talk with someone" as she doesn't see many people.

Beverly Blunda, new to the service, has large print books delivered every two weeks. She likes the selections, but did acknowledge that there are fewer choices in large print; she'll read whatever is brought if she can.

Thomas Furlong, a delivery volunteer, says he "very much enjoys the interactions with the patrons and they appreciate both the books and his calls." He delivers books to half a dozen people every other week at Gorham House and spends a few hours visiting with them. He makes sure they like the selections and reminds folks they can make special requests by calling the library. He had special praise for the library staff's helpfulness.

Part of what makes home delivery a success is access to books and library items, an area in which the Baxter library needs help. While the library participates in Minerva, a consortium of 65 libraries, its own collection size is well below that of Maine Public Library Standards. In an effort to boost the collection size, the Trustees have begun to develop an endowment and the Friends of Baxter Memorial Library are also working raise money to add items to the collection. Fundraising events, like the recent auction and wine tasting, are so important. This event, co-sponsored by the Friends of the library and the Gorham Educational Foundation, raised almost \$2000 for the library. Our heartfelt thanks go out to the many businesses and organizations which contributed items to be auctioned. Without this kind of community support, the library would not be able to serve the town as well as it does.

Changing Library Card Policy

In order to protect the privacy of library patrons and fully comply with Maine Confidentiality of Library Records law, the Baxter Library will be changing the way it handles library transactions.

Beginning in August, a library card or positive photo identification will be required for all library card transactions and inquiries. In addition, a family member or friend may pick up a reserve item for another person only if they have the library card of the person who reserved the item in hand.

While these changes may be inconvenient for some patrons, the Library will try to make this transition as easy as possible. They will be happy to hold items for up to a week if a library card or photo identification is not available. Just so no one goes home empty handed, a small collection of books for children and young adults will be available in the Youth Service Department from which a patron may select one book to borrow on an honor system basis. A similar arrangement will be available for adults as well. These books are from donations and are not part of the library's regular collections.

TOWN COUNCIL REPORT Boy Scouts Assess Town Council Meeting

Bintently as the agenda got underway at the July 7 meeting of the Town Council. Scout Master, Jon Patten, introduced the troop members, who were in attendance working toward earning their Citizenship and Community merit badge.

"The objective is to observe an issue where different opinions are heard," said committee member and troop parent, Ron Burton. "We'll then go back and discuss with the boys, hear their response, and reflect on the situation."

The Council meeting was an ideal forum for exposure to the troop, as several items where discussed that evening:

• The Council approved the proposal to send a letter to the Planning Board, asking the Board to encourage the extension of sewer and water on South Street whenever allowed by the

Land Use and Development Code. Councilor Burleigh Loveitt pointed out that the extension of utilities is essential for development of the town, and would seek further attempt to keep these expenses off the municipal tax rate. Vice Chairman Michael Phinney agreed, noting, "Anytime we can extend public water to serve an area, we should be doing that."

• Also approved was an overlimit per-

mit for the Maine Department of Transportation for Park and Ride project #CM-1615(400)X. The order was approved pending conditions that Town Manager, David Cole, provide specifics in regards to the current limit, size of the lot, and exact overlimit figure receiving approval.

Although raising significant discussion, the following proposal was approved with a count of 5 yeas and 2 nays (Councilors Noah Miner & Phillip Csoros). The approved proposal orders that an amendment to the Land Use and Development Code, requiring that developers provide the dedication and construction of roads to adjacent property, be sent to the Planning Board for public hearing and Planning Board recommendation.

Councilor Miner expressed his view, "If the purpose of the road extension is to let neighbors know that it may someday be developed, then this is a misuse of the ordinance." He advised that, "Neighbors buying these homes should do their due diligence and be aware of the possibility."

Councilor Csoros stated that he wasn't fully on board with this proposal for several reasons, noting that, if the primary purpose of the ordinance is to communicate to residents the potential of property development, signage would be a more efficient use of the town's funds. He also pointed out that construction of the roads would, "deny residents use of the natural, open space immediately, as they could otherwise have greenery at the end of their subdivision for several years before development begins."

- Town Manager David Cole reported that an application for the grant for the fire stations has been submitted, advising that approval of the grant might not be determined until July 2010. Mr. Cole also reported that he issued a 15 year service pin to Town Planner, Deb Fossum, thanking her for her service to the town.
- Councilor Miner reminded the public that, effective July 1, there is a convenience fee to pay by credit or debit card. He advised citizens might wish to bring checkbooks to avoid the fee.
- During Public Communication, Matt Mattingly, of Pine Crest Bed and Breakfast, invited everyone to the second annual Gorham Taste Walk which will be held on the last Saturday of July from 11 a.m.-2 p.m. He also mentioned that Pine Crest Bed and Breakfast will host a concert series every Sunday during the summer with live music on the side lawn from 3-5 p.m.



ver the course of the school year, 8th grade students on GMS' Chebeague Island Team raised \$215 to donate to the greater Portland chapter of Habitat for Humanity. They raised this money by selling photographs at the Gorham Art Fair in the fall and throughout the year at school. Each of the students worked with art teacher Mrs. Cousins to take a unique and original photograph. They edited the photographs using the iphoto editing system on their laptops, printed copies to sell and donated at least one photograph for the Gorham Art Fair. Habitat of Humanity was the chosen recipient as it tied into our year-long essential question "What is Humanity?" that was explored in both the social studies and ELA classes.

The team focused on this theme as they studied the Civil War and the Cold

War in social studies class and examined things such as the treatment of African Americans throughout U.S. History, as well as the treatment of Native Americans, Mexican Americans and other immigrants to this country. Students also learned about the treatment of Japanese Americans after Pearl Harbor, and most recently, the treatment of the Jews during the Holocaust. Finally, the students researched Modern Day Dictators and Crimes against Humanity that have occurred after the Holocaust in various parts of the world.

While our donation to Habitat for Humanity was small in the big scheme of things, the students gained a lot from their year-long study.


GMS Finishes First in Maine for "Pennies" Campaign Donna Pastore

Ohh, the Good Ole Days Beverly Mann-Lessard

ears before Hannaford Brothers built their store in Gorham, a log cabin with the name "Greenwoods" printed above the doorway occupied a piece of that property bordering Main Street. The name was later changed to "Mason's," but the sandwiches and friendly service remained the same. During the late 1950's my best friend and I would sometimes ask our moms for fifty cents so we could go out for lunch at Greenwoods.

The Campus School allotted an hour for lunch which gave my friends and I plenty of time to walk south on Fort Hill Road to the center of town and then east on Main Street.

Thinking back on those lunch dates, I'm amazed that we traveled so far at such a young age. It didn't feel amazing at the time but today I wonder how many parents would say "yes" to such a request from an eight yearold today.

We'd oftentimes pedal our bicycles uptown to Barden's Drug Store which was located on the corner of South and Main Streets across from the present day Amato's. Barden's consisted of two big rooms with a hall way connecting them both. One side was a pharmacy and the other was an ice cream parlor complete with juke box, booths and a soda jerk. A small freezer in the middle held the coveted popsicles and ice cream bars which one had to snatch up quickly for fear of bumping into a group of teenagers jitter bugging their way through the afternoon. For a decade or so, it was the place to be.

The movie theatre which doubled as the Catholic Church on Sundays was next door to the pharmacy. When Disney movies came to town, my mother stuffed wax sandwich bags full of popcorn and gave my oldest sibling enough money for tickets...fifty cents

they certainly had every reason to be upset," Risbara stated. Risbara Bros. acknowledged error and apologized, making arrangements for a cleaning crew to take care of the houses affected.

In order to prevent the problem from reccurring, Risbara met with those overseeing the crushing equipment and advised that the operation was to be shut down if dust exceeded acceptable levels.

"We are a family owned and operated business celebrating 42 years," Risbara explained."We do not run from problems and pride ourselves in doing what is right."

Risbara expressed his gratitude to all the neighbors "who have been great throughout the entire 18-month approval process," and hopes to have the same level of support over the remaining four months of construction.

Despite consistent rain over the past several weeks, Risbara feels they are still on schedule to complete blasting by the end of July, and crushing by mid-August.

home was through the graveyard which seems to be the only landmark in Gorham that has remained unchanged.


Yes, we traveled far away from home back then. We walked and we biked everywhere. Today's kids would make such journeys only with a fully charged cell phone.
