According to Thompson, police found hundreds of videos with child pornography in addition to the videos he had taken of her sister and a family friend, who reported the incident. The case went to trial and the girl who reported it had to testify but none of the victims had to. Berke was sentenced to 50 years in jail for his

he initial call on Feb. 23 of a truck in the water by the Eel Weir Dam off Middle Jam Road went to the Gorham Fire Department, although it turned out the truck had gone in just over the Standish line. The truck was first seen by an employee of Sappi Fine Paper, which owns the dam and routinely checks the nearby power station.

A water rescue team responded to the scene as there was the possibility that the truck had just gone into the water and that someone might have been trapped inside. However, the team was not able to get into the water for several hours as the truck had been sucked up against the gates of the dam and it would not have been possible for the divers to safely go into the water there.

Chief Robert Lefebvre of the Gorham Fire Department described the rescue effort as a "good cooperative effort by everyone. Sappi sent their engineers to the scene to determine what needed to be done to make it safe for the divers to enter the water."

The gates at Route 35 were closed, cutting the flow of water out of the lake and cutting the flow down to the power station. The power generators were shut down, and once the gates were closed, they were ultimately able to open the gates at the dam and lower the water level in the canal, which relieved the water pressure and allowed the divers to go in the water about four and a half hours after the truck was first seen. However, shutting down the flow and lowering the water level stirred up the clay lining which severely limited the divers' vision.

As there was no longer any possibility of rescuing anyone who might have been in the truck, a decision was made to use a crane to pull the truck out of the water. There was no one in the truck. The pickup truck, a Ford F-150 with South Carolina plates, had been reported stolen the previous day from the Travelodge on Brighton Ave. in Portland.

Legislative Update from Senator Bartlett

his session, I have had the opportunity to support two important pieces of legislation aimed at protecting Maine citizens who face expensive medical costs due to illness. The health care debate continues at the federal level, but here in Maine, we are taking action to protect the people of this state.

The first bill, An Act to Protect
Health Care Consumers from
Catastrophic Medical Debt, would
eliminate annual and lifetime caps on
health insurance to ensure that people
get the care they need when they
need it. The need for this change was
most evident during the public hearing and after listening to a Maine family directly impacted by their health
insurance cap.

The family paid their insurance premiums for years in hopes that it would be there when they needed it the most. Unfortunately, this was not the case. In 2008, the husband was diagnosed with skin cancer. As the medical care and bills built up, it did not take long for the family to fall into serious financial trouble. Again, the family had insurance, but they hit a lifetime cap.

This bill is important because no hard working Maine family or individual should face the risk of financial ruin because they have contracted a devastating medical illness. Battling the illness and receiving the proper care should be the only concern. A fundamental principle of health insurance is that it should be there when one needs it.

I also sponsored LD 1676, An Act to Protect Maine Citizens' Credit. This legislation would prevent health care providers, or debt collectors working for those providers, from reporting certain medical debts on a consumer's credit report as long as a minimum payment is being made.

Credit reporting agencies have a tremendous amount of power to impact a person's life, and no Maine resident should have necessary medical care harm their credit. This bill would amend the Fair Credit Reporting Act to ensure that people who are making the minimum monthly payment do not have their credit harmed.

I believe this legislation will also help debt collectors receive payments. People are likely to make a payment if they can afford the minimum amount. Conversely, the incentive to make a payment diminishes if one cannot afford a high amount.

In other happenings at the State House, the State Treasurer recently released the annual unclaimed property list. The list consists of money and other personal assets that are considered lost or abandoned when an owner cannot be located after a specified period of time.

Last year, over \$12 million was returned to 18,562 rightful owners in Maine. In Senate District 6 (which includes Gorham, Scarborough, and Westbrook) there are 1,653 unclaimed properties listed this year and \$232,716 waiting to be claimed.

The list is online and I would recommend taking a minute to search for your name. Perhaps you have some unclaimed property? Go to www. maine.gov/unclaimed to see if you have some money coming your way.

HS senior Jon Day has found a way to excel in the sports arena as well as on the stage. Not only has he participated in football, basketball and outdoor track, he also assumed the leading role as Tony in last year's GHS performance of West Side Story and will play a leading role in the upcoming performance of FAME.

Day started playing sports while growing up and has continued throughout high school. But when it came to performing in musicals, Day did not take an interest until reaching high school. During his freshman year, GHS music teacher Darrell Morrow, who has since retired, encouraged Day to join the chorus. "He also motivated me to join the Chamber Singers my sophomore year," Day added. "By getting to know people in both groups, I became interested in trying out for the musicals."

Day's first musical role was a character called Harry The Horse in Guys & Dolls during his sophomore year. As a junior, he wanted to go for the leading role of Tony. "We studied West Side Story in seventh-grade, and ever since I have loved that story and the role of Tony," Day said. "When it came time to try-out, I wanted that role really bad and told the play director, Mr. Avery, I would work harder than anyone."

Bruce Avery remembers what Jon wrote and said, "Jon was a man of his word and performed Tony brilliantly. That's not just my opinion, ask anyone who saw the show. His physical strength was a huge asset in West Side Story, allowing for incredible lifts during the ballet."

Day is now getting ready to perform the role of Nick in FAME at GHS.

It has been a challenge for Day to balance his schedule when basketball season and the musical rehearsals take place at the same time in February. "It is particularly difficult trying to do both in the same day," he said. "I would go from the end of school to the musical rehearsal for two plus hours and then basketball practice or games for more and more hours every day."

Day said that his basketball coach, Josh Longstaff and the musical director Bruce Avery have been understanding and allowed him to balance both commitments. "I did not realize how tough it would be," Day said. "But both Coach Longstaff and Mr.

Avery were very understanding."

"Jon is an extremely hardworking and talented young man," said Longstaff. "He has balanced basketball and the musical without any distractions. Jon is the perfect example of what a team player should be and is a great role model for his younger peers."

Avery added to Longstaff's comments by saying, "Jon is a talented athlete but is as talented on the stage. Acting comes relatively easily to Jon, but he has to work at 'the dance' part. But he was one of the first to master the 'dolphin' move that everyone should watch for in FAME."

Next fall, Day plans to attend Bridgton Academy prep school and play for the football team. He also hopes to eventually perform in musicals as an adult. For now, with the basketball season behind him and spring track yet to start, he can focus all of his efforts on the FAME performances.

Arrests Quell Rash of Burglaries

ith the arrest of a juvenile suspected in one burglary and another attempted burglary, as well as the arrest of an adult for burglaries in the Hurricane Road, Flaggy Meadow Road/Groveville (Buxton) area, the number of burglaries being committed appears to have been substantially reduced. In addition to cash found in the burglaries, the suspects primarily took jewelry and electronics, but in at least one instance stole a snowmobile with an approximate value of \$15,000. The snowmobile has been recovered with the assistance of the Warden Service. The adult. who was arrested in Westbrook, was believed to have been involved in multiple burglaries, and police are also looking for two other adults whom they believe may have also been involved.

• A blue-eyed white male, 6' to 6'2", weighing about 180–200 pounds,

wearing a white hooded sweatshirt, a white bandanna, jeans and sneakers robbed the Movie Gallery on Main Street on Feb. 19 at about 10:40 p.m. He came into the store with a knife, according to the clerk who was working at the time, and demanded to be given money. Anyone with any information about this case is asked to call Detective Sears Edwards of the Gorham Police Department at 839-5046.

• Sherman Boulter, 88, of Steep Falls was killed in motor vehicle crash in Gorham on Feb. 24. Boulter was driving eastbound on Route 25 when his vehicle failed to negotiate the turn, crossed the road and hit a tree at about 11 a.m. He was taken to Maine Medical Center, where he was pronounced dead. Gorham Police were reconstructing the crash but were unable to determine the cause at press time.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT

In-Classroom Cuts Could Loom for Gorham Schools

t the School Committee's
February meeting,
Superintendent Ted Sharp
reported on the following:

- Laughn Berthiaume, Girls Varsity
 Basketball Coach, was recognized
 as Coach of the Year for the SMA
 Conference. The team was also recognized for their outstanding sportsmanship.
- The Association of Maine Athletic Directors adopted a new leadership award named after Gerry Durgin, Athletic Director for Gorham.
- Expressed his gratitude to the Town Council for allowing the Sebago Alliance to continue to utilize the Little Falls site for programs.
- FY11 budget is being rolled out on Feb. 24. Between the FY09 and FY10 budgets, 38 positions have already been eliminated. The district currently has one of the lowest student/teacher ratios in Cumberland County.

Chairman Dennis Libby reported that he and Sharp worked on a letter outlining the impact that the Governor's proposed budget will have on the district. "Reduced revenue and keeping the mill rate flat in Gorham for Education for the past two years has caused us to reduce 38 positions. While only two have been in-classroom teaching positions, we will have no choice but to look within classrooms for further reductions without increasing the town's property taxes for education." He urged legislators to "stand up and be bold for students and to consider all aspects of what reducing GPA will have on the state and districts."

Libby also said that Councilor Phil Csoros requested he perform an energy usage analysis for school buildings, which found that energy costs were favorable when compared to industry standards.

Kathy Pizzo, Cindy Muele, Laurie Sibley and Erika Ouellette-Vigneault, Instructional Strategists within the district, provided an update on Response to Intervention (RTI). The purpose of the RTI team, is to intervene when students are not meeting standards, monitor student response to intervention, provide teachers with support and to advance district goal of having more students meeting standard. The team is working to bring Strategic Classes, Learning Labs, Core Study Skills Curriculum, Study Halls, Homework Clubs, after school tutoring, community outreach and other initiatives to all schools in the district.

The School Committee voted (6-0, Marie South was absent) to accept the recommendations from the Pay to Participate (P2P) Committee and not adopt a formal program. Mike Wing, Chairman of the P2P Committee, reported to the School Committee that Gorham already has a "P2P mechanism in place through community fundraising" and also recommended that "efforts be made to support and promote the community culture that currently exists." After thorough research and analysis, the committee determined that 55% of the funding for both athletic and non-athletic activities comes from the school budget. Approximately \$656,000 covers coach stipends, uniforms, facility maintenance, officials, transportation and other activity-related supplies. The remaining 45% is funded through community support. An estimated \$88,317 is raised through Booster funds,

Internet Connects Book Lovers

Internet services like Facebook and Twitter, more people are turning to their computers to connect with friends and family. These services have made it easier than ever before to share pictures, stories, and videos, bringing people together from across the country and the world.

But Facebook and other social networking services are only the tip of the iceberg. The Internet has become easier to use, making it an inviting way to connect with new friends, based on your interests.

One interest in particular that has many opportunities for connection on the Internet is books. No longer are readers restricted to the book that a local reading group has chosen; nor do they have to rely on others to point them in the direction of new books that might be of interest.

What follows is a brief look at a few places on the Web to connect with other book lovers by no means a complete list, but some good starting places. Please note that all of the sites mentioned here are free to access.

THE MILLIONS: Since 2003, The Millions (www.themillions.com) has been a go-to Web site for a wide variety of book-related information. Reviews, discussions, interviews, recommendations, previews, quizzes, essays—they're all there. Similar to this site, and also recommended, is The Second Pass (thesecondpass.com).

LIBRARYTHING: Based in Maine, LibraryThing (www.librarything.com) has a devoted national following of readers. The site started as a simple way to catalog your book collection, to keep track of what you own, when you bought it, and so on. Some people use it as a record of their home library in case of fire or theft. Since those simple beginnings, it has expanded greatly, with discussion boards, reviews, recommendations, and a deep system for hooking you up with people that share your reading interests. They also have an "early reviewer" program for anyone interested in getting early copies of their favorite authors' books.

INDEPENDENTS: For many readers, independent bookstores are the lifeblood of the reading community. The people working at indies are committed, passionate readers, and it shows in the quality of books they carry. Locally, The Bookworm (thebookwormgorham.com) offers speedy, special order service in a friendly small -town setting. You may already be familiar with Portland's Longfellow Books (www.longfellowbooks.com), although you may not have known that they are also an online bookseller now. IndieBound (www.indiebound. org) is a great Web site that helps to connect readers across the country with independent bookstores. They also have a community of passionate readers, recommending books you might not hear about in the warehouse-style book superstores.

key element to the success of children in school is the learning of basic social skills. Social skills are displayed in many ways, and like other skills, they improve with practice. Here are some that parents can engage their children in socializing:

- Handling transition: Establish routines at home to help your child understand that there are specific times that certain activities will take place such as meals, nap time, and play time.
- Getting along with others: Set up play dates with other children, go to the library, venture to the local park or enroll them in a preschool. Having your children exposed to other kids the same age will help them learn these social skills together.
- **Sharing:** Put your child in a position where they share a snack with you. This is a great way to start the sharing concept of "half for you and half for me."
- Taking turns: Teach your child games such as Duck, Duck, Goose, Simon Says, or a board game like Candyland. Encourage your child to take turns throughout the day. For example, when you're chatting on the phone, explain that it is not OK to interrupt a conversation, it is your turn to talk and when you are finished, it will be their turn.
- Good sportsmanship: Model appropriate winning and losing behavior when playing games with your child.
- Expressing emotions: Read different books about feelings. You can draw happy, sad, and other emotion faces on a piece of paper and go over the feelings with your child.

very well still be at large and committing heinous sex crimes. The recognition of her involvement in that investigation is well deserved," said Thompson.

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
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Who Let the Dog Out?

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
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
