

Town Seizes Fraternity House Sheri Faber

ccording to Town Manager David Cole, the Town has encouraged the development of payment plans for property owners who have fallen behind in their taxes. This comes as a result of an increase in the number of properties where no effort was being made to pay back taxes.

In February 2010, the Town Council authorized the sale of three properties, all with high outstanding balances that had been given one final 30-day opportunity for the bills to be paid in full. Two of the three property owners paid all outstanding taxes, interest, and costs resulting in receiving quitclaim deeds. The third owner was unable to come up with the money and the property was put up for sale, but there were no bidders. The Town intends to solicit bids for that property once the real estate market improves.

During the review of properties with unpaid taxes, the fraternity house at 27 Preble St., home to the Gamma

Omega chapter of Phi Kappa Sigma, was found to be significantly in arrears, with matured real property tax liens for the 2004/05, 2005/06, 2006/07, and 2007/08 years. In 2005, Wai Kue Yee, then president of the fraternity, signed an agreement with the Town to pay \$200 per month starting in May 2005 and to continue until the fraternity was up-to-date on their taxes. Payments have been sporadic with the last \$200 payment made in October 2009. The total amount owed as of May 20, 2010 was \$26,937.

In his report to the Council, Cole noted the Fraternity had a "long history of problems associated with neighborhood disturbances from parties requiring response by the police." In addition, the property had been shut down for six months several years ago due to serious code violations following an inspection by the Fire Department. At that time the violations were corrected and the

Gorham Police Make Arrests in String of Burglaries Sheri Faber

olice received numerous reports of residential burglaries in the White Rock area during the months of June and July. There were also several reports of commercial, residential, and motor vehicle burglaries in the South Gorham area during the month of June. After conducting police investigations, two people were arrested including Alexander Cody McPhee, 21, of Gorham, charged with the White Rock area burglaries, and a 17-year old juvenile, charged with the South Gorham burglaries.

McPhee was seen in the common area of a duplex in White Rock, which was reported to police by a resident. Police looked at McPhee as a suspect in the crimes and, on July 12, charged him with possession of stolen property. While he was in custody, another report of burglary came in. Police obtained a search warrant and recovered \$25,000 in stolen property, much of it jewelry. McPhee was charged with eight counts of burglary, eight counts of theft, and two counts of criminal mischief. Detective Sears Edwards and Officer Wayne Drown were the investigating officers on the White Rock cases.

Forensic evidence found at the scene of one crime in South Gorham led police to the juvenile suspect. The 17-year old was charged with six counts of burglary, five counts of theft, and five counts of criminal mischief. Detective Sears Edwards investigated these burglaries.

Police have many unclaimed jewelry items. Anyone missing jewelry should contact the Gorham Police Department at 839-5046.

hen Narragansett School was built thirty years ago, the Town should have obtained a Site Permit for the Department of Environmental Protection. When it was discovered that no permit had been obtained, the Town applied for and received its permit in June 2009. The Site Permit requires the Town to construct a Storm Water Detention Pond, which is now being constructed in front of Narragansett School. The detention pond, which will be fenced in, will provide both retention and treatment of storm water runoff. As part of the upgrades to the property, it became necessary to move the gazebo from the lawn of the Public Safety building to the lawn of the Municipal Center. Two trees closest to the Municipal Center building will soon be removed in order to clear space for the gazebo, where, during the summer months, weekly concerts are held.

The second phase of the Chick Master Plan calls for a road to be built, which will start at the current entry road leading to the Public Safety Building and will cross the current ball fields and come out on Route 202 across from Hillview Drive.

Legislative Highlights

n July 12, many of the bills that were passed by the Legislature and Governor during the legislative session officially became law. The Constitution of Maine requires a bill, unless it is an emergency bill, to become effective in 90 days after the Legislature adjourns for the year. The following is a "little bit of everything" legislative highlight of new state laws that may be of interest to you:

Because of so many stories of individuals and families who end up in debt due to an illness, I was proud to sponsor legislation aimed at protecting the credit ratings of those faced with enormous debt from medical bills. Often times, someone with high debt will see a negative impact on their credit report. Now, such debt will no longer negatively impact one's credit ratings so long as they are conscientiously making minimum payments on medically related debt.

In an effort to help protect Maine consumers, the 124th Legislature put into law two significant bills aimed at unexpected charges. New law prohibits unauthorized credit card charges that usually follow after the expiration of a free-trial offer. Maine consumers can now take advantage of free-trial programs with the confidence that they will not be billed later or incur unwanted financial obligations and hassles. The second law will protect debit card users from unexpected surcharges just for using the card. Previous Maine law prohibits this kind of surcharge on the use of a credit card and now debit cards are protected as well.

The residents of Gorham may be aware of the benefits of geothermal energy, with the use of it in our middle school. Understanding the importance of alternative energy, the Legislature supported a resolve to examine policy options and develop recommendations to promote and provide incentives for the installation of residential geothermal heating and cooling systems.

Years ago, we implemented the Amber Alert system to help locate missing children. Based on the same intent, new law creates a Silver Alert program to find missing persons who suffer from dementia and other cognitive disorders. This is important since nearly 30,000 people suffer from Alzheimer's in Maine. Of that population, an estimated sixty percent will wander from caregivers at some point.

Over the past few years, we have seen more cases of animal cruelty and neglect around the state. To address this issue, new law gives the state the option to charge criminals for the cost of relocating the animals and probation may be added as part of the sentencing. This is important because, unfortunately, those who are cruel to animals tend to repeat abuse, even against people.

The volume of trash at Plan-It Recycling & Transfer Facility, Inc. has created a number of violations including piles that are too close together. In the event of a fire, an emergency vehicle would not be able to drive between the piles. The Town has gone to court seeking a temporary restraining order to prevent Plan-It Recycling from accepting any more waste until the various violations are corrected and the facility is back in compliance with applicable laws.

Construction is near completion for a park-and-ride facility adjacent to the bypass roundabout on Rt. 114. This facility was part of the plans for the original project.

This past June, voters approved a \$3,000,000 road bond that will be used to improve North Gorham Road and Finn Parker Road, both of which were not done with the first bond issue. The improvements will include road rebuilding, rehabilitation, ditching, culvert replacement, tree clearing, and paving within the Town right of way. Due to the high price of asphalt and other construction costs, the Town was only able to do the planned improvements on four roads; whereas, the road bond issue was planned to cover the cost of doing six roads. Normally the money from the bonds would include widening and repaving the roads, and, if necessary, creating shoulders and drainage improvements. Like many states and towns, Gorham is struggling to maintain its roads. Eventually the decision must be made to extend the life of a road by repaving or if the Town should completely redo it. There are some roads the Town anticipates will revert to gravel, as the Town does not have enough money to repair them.

2nd fl Thriftiques Shop Offers Vintage Finds and Repurposed

ocated on the second floor of 8 School Street (above the former Sierra's Bar & Grill), the 2nd fl Thriftiques Shop features vintage products including collectibles and memorabilia spanning from the roaring 1920's to the late 1980's. The shop also has many repurposed treasures, which are items artistically reclaimed from vintage pieces.

While the shop is small, the owner, Sherrie Fontaine, thoughtfully managed to create full displays of many items, without having a cluttered and congested look, as might a booth at an antique shop. Various vintage signs denote the categorical vignettes including "Mama's Kitsch'n" with Pyrex and aprons (pictured); "Aunt Lu Lu's Closet" with jewelry, gloves, and hats; "Nana's Pantry" with older pieces like bean pots and blue and white china; and "Papa's Study" with maps, books, and a Philco Radio from the 1930's.

When asked why vintage finds are currently popular, Fontaine replied: "the furniture, house-wares in general, clothing, and jewelry of yesteryear, all were better made than what is being mass-produced today. The fact that these items are still useable is a testament to their quality. By using vintage products, fewer items end up in landfills and often less petroleum-based

plastics are produced. It is an added bonus if that glass happens, like one your Nana had in her kitchen, brings back happy memories of a simpler time." She also noted that unlike proper antiques, which can be rather pricey, vintage items are still very affordable. Fontaine's prices are very reasonable making her shop a perfect store for the entire community.

Q: What types of things affect your credit score?

You can work and work to build a solid credit history with a resulting impressive credit score. You would think, given such a great track record, you would be given a little more leeway for an isolated glitch than someone with a history of credit problems. The truth is, the higher your score the further it will tumble compared to someone with a marginal score given the same glitch. Many wonder how much damage missing a payment or maxing out a credit card will do to their credit score. The fact is, it depends on your beginning score. MSN.com personal finance columnist Liz Pullman went directly to FICO, the company that created the credit score and asked input on how much various items hurt your score and was provided the following score deductions (effect on a 680 score / 780 score):

- -60 to -80 / -90 to -110
- · Maxed out card:

- -10 to -30 / -25 to -45
- -45 to -65 / -105 to -125 · Foreclosure:
- -85 to -105 / -140 to -160

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TOWN COUNCIL REPORT

Topical Outline Sheri Faber

n July 6 the Town Council met and covered a variety of topics. The discussion included:

- State Representative Jane Knapp announced she would be available to meet with constituents prior to regular Town Council meetings from 6-7 p.m. at Baxter Library
- David Kent, Fort Hill Road, felt the Town should have one polling place since the current two are not very far apart.
- **Councilor Matt Mattingly** announced the Third Annual Taste Walk will be held on July 25, followed by a free concert. Proceeds from the event will go toward scholarships for Gorham High School students.
- Town Manager David Cole reported that, for the seventh year in a row, the Town was awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. He thanked Finance Director Maureen Finger and her staff and noted the award was very good for the Town's bond rating.
- As the Recreation Department now has full-time professional staff, the Recreation Advisory Committee is no longer needed and was changed from a standing committee to an appointed one that will only meet if needed.
- Council voted 6-1 (Miner) to refer a proposal to the Planning Board to amend the Land Use and Development Code by adding a definition of "fraternity house" and eliminating fraternity houses as a permitted use. Council also voted to refer a proposal to regulate existing fraternity houses to the Ordinance Committee.

- · Council voted to authorize the new fire/rescue vehicle, approved by the voters in June, to be purchased at a cost of \$444,300.
- · A request to extend the Shotgun-Only Hunting Zone further east in Gorham was also sent to the Ordinance Committee.
- · A request for an ordinance to regulate windmills was sent to the Planning Board on a 6-1 vote (Csoros).
- A proposal to amend the Land Use and Development Code to have certain applications or approvals expire after a period of inactivity was sent to the Planning Board on a 4-3 vote (Mattingly, Miner, Phinney).
- A proposal to amend the Shoreland Zoning Ordinance was referred to the Planning Board on a 5-2 vote (Csoros, Mattingly).
- · The Town Manager was authorized to notify Portland Water District that the Town does not want to acquire a piece of property off Tow Path Road, formerly used as a sewer treatment facility.
- The Council approved a three-year extension of the lease with Gorham Cooperative Preschool for use of the building at the intersection of Ball Park Road and Access Road.
- The Council approved an updated mutual aid agreement for police activities with municipalities in Cumberland County.
- Councilors went into executive session for a discussion on abatement of taxes based on poverty. The application was denied as the person was found to have sufficient assets to contribute to the public charge and taxes on the property were not delinquent.



CHIEF SHEPARD REPORTS

Grand Jury Indictments

The Grand Jury returned the following indictments in July:

- Justin Cram, 30, of Gorham, was indicted for being a habitual offender and for violating conditions of release on charges brought by the Portland Police Department.
- Suzanne Doyon, 41, of Biddeford, was indicted for possession of schedule W drugs, possession of oxycodone, and OUI on charges brought by the Gorham Police Department.
- · Kevin Sawyer, 24, of Gorham, was indicted for being a habitual offender and for failure to give his correct name on charges brought by the Gorham Police Department.

In addition to the indictments above, copper wire was stolen from the South Gorham CMP substation and two spools of copper wire, each weighing about 80 pounds, were also stolen from the building site of the new elementary school.

SUMMER OUTDOORS

Beating the Heat and Appreciating Nature Jason Beever

ere we are almost halfway through another summer season. So far this summer stands in stark contrast with last year's weather, with relatively little precipitation and very warm temperatures. The longest day occurred back on June 21st, so the days are already getting shorter. It is time to get outdoors and enjoy this great season.

For many folks, hot weather means seeking recreation in and around the water. In Gorham we are fortunate to have public access to the beautiful Presumpscot River at Shaw Park. The Presumpscot is the primary outlet of Sebago Lake, ensuring the water is cool and refreshing on even the hottest of days. Shaw Park is located off Route 237 (Sebago Lake Road), on the right just past Gambo Road. In addition to a sandy beach area, there are ball fields here, as well as miles of hiking, including a trail through the historic Gambo Falls and powder mills.

If you want to get out on the water, the Gorham Recreation Department has canoes for rent at Shaw Park as well. To reserve a canoe please call the Rec Department at 222-1630. I recently learned that they also have fly fishing rods and golf club sets for public use. A modest deposit is required and refunded when you return the undamaged items. Cindy Hazelton and her friendly staff will gladly provide suggestions on where to try your luck fishing or to hit some golf balls.

Hiking is a popular summer activity, best enjoyed during the cooler morning or evening hours. Remember to wear light, breathable clothing, sturdy footwear, sunscreen, bug dope, and to bring plenty of water. In addition to the trails at Shaw Park, miles of trail exist in other areas around town. Try exploring the trail system at Little River, with parking located on Gray Road, just past Little River Drive or the scenic Hawkes Towpath trail along the Presumpscot River. Parking for this trail is at the end of Tow Path Road, off Route 202 in the Little Falls area.

For more ambitious hikers, there is a great trail system at Pleasant Mountain in the Denmark / Bridgton area. Better known for the Shawnee Peak ski area, Pleasant Mountain has elevations exceeding 1800 feet and is less than an hour drive from Gorham. Spectacular views of the White Mountains to the North and the Lakes Region to the South and East reward Pleasant Mountain hikers. While some of the steeper portions will get your heart beating in a hurry, it is common to see family groups with young children, so don't hesitate to give it a try. There are several trails and access points, maintained by the Loon Echo Land Trust. For more information on this great natural treasure, check out their web site: http://loonecholandtrust.org and click on the "Trail Info" tab.

Our Maine summer season slips away quickly. Fishing for trout in local brooks and streams will end on August 15, less than a month away. The special archery season for deer begins about a month after that, in mid September. Don't delay; get outdoors for some summer fun before autumn arrives.

fraternity was allowed to reopen. On June 2, Fire Chief Bob Lefebvre, Deputy Fire Chief Ken Fickett, and Code Officer David Twomey inspected the premises once again. They found innumerable problems with the structure including all roofs in need of replacement, holes in walls, the presence of mold, use of extension cords as permanent wiring, stairs without handrails, fire extinguishers discharged or out of inspection compliance, trash strewn about, and possession of stolen street signs.

At the Town Council meeting on July 6, the Council voted to seize the property (land and buildings) for back taxes. Fraternity members were given until the end of the month to vacate the premises. Cole expects the house, which is said to be structurally sound, will be cleaned out and repairs made within a reasonable amount of time so the Town can solicit bids for the property. The Town plans to sell the property with deed restrictions that would prohibit the house from

becoming a fraternity or boarding house. The assessed value is approximately \$259,000.

The house, built in 1880, has 15 rooms including nine bedrooms and five baths. Phi Kappa Sigma purchased the property in October 2003 from Marie-Noelle Ces, of the Bahamas, who currently holds the mortgage on the property. At the Town Council meeting a lawyer who represented Ces pointed out that she would lose a substantial amount of money if the Town seized the property. However, as the mortgage holder, Ces was routinely notified that the property taxes were in arrears.

In town there are three other properties housing fraternities and sororities. Two are current on their taxes and the third has a property tax lien that would foreclose next year. According to Cole, however, "active efforts are being made to pay the outstanding taxes" and Cole believes they will be paid before the tax lien forecloses.

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
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Bird-brained Aggression

Caller reported an unoccupied vehicle was parked and running for at least 20 minutes. Vehicle was occupied by a male waiting for his child in dance class.


