## **New Shaw Bros.** Headquarters Growing Bill Ambrose

riving north on Mosher Road (Route 237), is a large and impressive construction site on the left. It is the new headquarters of Shaw Brothers Construction, Inc. Located approximately ¾ of a mile from Main Street, the site is on the grounds of Shaw's quarry and future asphalt plant, previously the LaChance Brickyard.

When completed in the fall of 2011, the new facility will replace Shaw Brothers' current headquarters at 511 Main Street. It will provide offices, a maintenance shop, and a cold storage building. A fueling station is also planned. The buildings will encompass more than 48,000 square feet. Dick Butterfield, the project's construction manager, says the new headquarters represents the company's ability to look 30 years into the future and reflects its faith in the growth of the local economy.


The new maintenance shop will

## **New School Attendance Zones** Stacy Sallinen



ttendance zones for the three elementary schools in Gorham were announced and unanimously approved during the School Committee's November meeting.

These zones, which determine where children will attend school once the district moves to three K-5 schools, will become effective in September 2011 when the new

elementary school is scheduled to open. Currently Narragansett and White Rock schools hold students in grades K-2, and Village School holds students in grades 3-5. Once the new elementary school opens, White Rock will close as a school; its future use has not yet been determined.

The rationale used in determining attendance zones include safety,

## Dear Gorbam Times,

My name is Katelyn Michaud; I am a lifelong resident of Gorham. I graduated from the U. Maine-Farmington in 2008 with a degree in Biochemistry and I am currently a graduate student in Public Health at the University of New England. I am interested in a career in global health. I have a strong desire to assist

under-served populations because I believe they deserve access to basic items such as clean water and food and quality medical services. Nearly one billion people lack access to safe drinking water and over 2.5 billion do not have adequate sanitation, which can lead to deadly diseases. Millions of people worldwide die each day because they do not have access to basic medicines and care for curable diseases, such as malaria and water-borne diseases. In December I will be embarking on a two-week medical mission to Costa Rica and Panama with International Service Learning. ISL is an international educational NGO who enlists medical and educational teams that provide services to under-served populations in Central and South America, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Africa. The cost of the program is \$1,870. I am paying for my own flight to and from Costa Rica, daily meals and part of the program cost. I am seeking sponsorship money to help defray the costs of the program. My fundraising goal is \$1200 and I will donate 40% of my total fundraising to Partners for World Health, a Portland-based non-profit that collects discarded unused medical equipment donated from local hospitals and distributes them to organizations and people worldwide and to Konbit Sante, an organization that works in parallel with Haitians to provide quality health care services to the local population in Haiti. school enrollments, class size, program equity, bus routing, traffic patterns and distances, travel time, weather and bus capacity.

Since the children's home address determines where they attend school, a family's choice of daycare will no longer impact where the child attends school. Transportation will be provided from licensed childcare sites to all three elementary schools.

The attendance zone for the Great Falls school, with a projected enrollment of 482 students for next year, includes areas north of Route 25/ Ossippee Trail, with the exception of Lover's Lane, Rust Road, Farrington Road and Alexander Drive. It includes Fort Hill Road, north of College Avenue, Gray Road, Queen Street and Mosher Road, White Rock, North Gorham and Little Falls areas.

The attendance zone for Village School, with a projected enrollment

of 420 students, includes Landing Drive, Rte. 25/Ossipee Trail, Lover's Lane, Rust Road, Farrington Road and Alexander Drive, as well as areas south of Rte. 25/Ossipee Trail, South Street to County Road, McLellan Road area to the golf course and Day Road.

Narragansett School attendance area includes Main Street east of New Portland Road to the Westbrook line, Libby Avenue, Gateway Commons, Bracket Road, Country Road and the South Gorham area. Its projected enrollment for next year is 251 students.

Superintendent Ted Sharp cautioned that enrollment numbers and class ratios are frequently adjusted until the school budget is approved by the School Committee, Town Council and by voter referendum.

## around town

A judge signed a court order implementing a negotiated settlement between the Town of Gorham and Plan-It Recycling. The order requires Plan-It Recycling to remove more tonnage from their site than they bring in daily, with the intent of being in full compliance by the middle of next year.

The Town is planning to put a metal roof on the Public Safety building on Main Street to replace the old roof that had major leaks. A study was done recommending that the Town add dormers to provide additional storage space for the Police Department and additional living and storage space for the Fire Department. Because of the poor economy, the work was put on hold; however, it now makes economic sense to add the dormers before the new metal roof is installed.

The Police Department currently uses the upstairs space for storage but that space was filled with records. For the Fire Department, the dormers will mean more living space for the live-in and on call firefighters, paramedics and EMT's.

The pillars supporting the overhang in the front of the building are also to be replaced as part of this upgrade.

be used to keep Shaw's huge equipment inventory running smoothly. It will have a special wash bay that will recycle the water from the cleaning process.

At present, only the cold storage building is rising above its foundations. Contrary to its name, the building is not a refrigerated structure; it will be used to house equipment, tools and materials that do not require heat during the winter months. It is slated for completion at the end of 2010. The 80 by 300-foot cold storage building will include a scale house used to weigh trucks which will have a 135-ton capacity.

Following completion, the concrete and steel buildings will be given a brick façade. In an effort to reach out to the site's history, the bricks will be those made by the former LaChance Brickyard.

Shaw Brothers Construction, Inc. is a local, homegrown success story. As one of the largest private employers in the area, it is an economic powerhouse, bidding on and winning major local and state contracts. The firm is an important presence in Gorham, maintaining multiple places of business. Several years ago, it constructed and donated Shaw Park on Sebago Lake Road to the town.

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## The Sacrifices of a Gorham Soldier Sarah Gavett-Nielsen

ergeant Justin Nealy (GHS '04) enlisted in the service in 2004 with the goal of protecting his country and the people he loves. Justin was raised in Gorham and is described by his family as a strong man who has always had a passion for being outdoors. While attending high school, he was inspired to join the military after the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. Justin is very passionate about his career and is considering re-enlisting after his eight-year term is up in 2012. This decision will not come without sacrifice, as he has an 11-month-old son with his wife, Meghan Cummings, also of Gorham. He has very limited contact with his family but is able to communicate with them for a few minutes each day via video chat.

Justin knows all too well the sacrifices that come with serving in the military. Eight days after his son was born in 2009, his older brother Gary was diagnosed with acute myelogenous leukemia. Justin was only able to see his brother twice between the time he was diagnosed and when he passed away. Justin felt he did not have a proper amount of time to grieve before being called back into duty. Even though he did not want to return to the service so

soon after his brother's passing "he realized it was his job and he put his war face on and went to war," said his mother, Angela.

Throughout his military career Justin has been stationed in Germany, Iraq, and Afghanistan. We are very proud of him and love him so much."

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

School Committee Chairman Dennis Libby reported on the following:

- The new elementary school building is projected to be completed on time.
- The School Department agreed to place this year's holiday tree at Narragansett School.
- The November 8 school closing was due to power outages and closed streets.
- Blackboard Connect, a new web system available through Sebago Alliance, will be used to send emails, make attendance phone calls and help improve communication.

- The reassignment of the administrative team for levels K through five.
- The Maine School Board Association considered and endorsed a proposal to review how health care is provided.

Rep. Jane Knapp reported on the folowing:

- State purchase of the Montreal, Maine and Atlantic Railway line.
- The reduction of Extended Unemployment Benefits.
- Awareness of lead poisoning dangers.
- New websites: www.internhelpme. com, which helps students find internships; www.maine.gov/ mema/weather/genweath.htm, which promotes winter weather awareness; and www.maine.gov/ dhhsdashboard, which was launched for accessing information collected by the Department of Health and Human Services.

## **Fraternity/Sorority Ordinance**

Meeting with Citizens, USM, and Greeks Robin Somes

meeting was held on November 17 with USM staff, representatives of Delta Chi Fraternity and Phi Mu Sorority houses, and neighboring citizens. Attendees included USM Chief Student Affairs Officer Craig Hutchinson, Executive Director of Public Affairs Bob Caswell, Associate Director for Student Life Jason Saucier, six Preble Street residents, Police Sergeant Michael Nault and Chief Ron Shepard.

As previously reported, incidents have occurred in the Preble Street neighborhood concerning loud music, parties necessitating police involvement, and other behavior of concern to area residents. Action was taken to establish accord between all area residents. Over the past year, involvement and cooperation between local residents, USM and Greek officials, police, Town Council and Ordinance Committee has resulted in significant progress towards this goal. The Ordinance to Regulate Fraternity and Sorority Houses was created to establish regulations to ensure concurrence in Gorham where non-campus

Fraternity/Sorority houses exist.

Town citizens reported there have not been any incidents lately. It was expressed that the intention is not to impede on Greek life, but to attain amity amongst all neighborhood residents. Concern was expressed about sustaining the guidelines in light of members leaving and new members arriving. The Greek representatives explained their procedures including documenting all guidelines and current rules and reviewing them with all new members. They also indicated they are fine with the Ordinance regulations and plan to comply as they are sensitive to past circumstances and their position within the neighborhood. Events have been suspended until the Ordinance is formally established and all future events would be communicated to neighbors. They also suggested a "seminar" where details and aspects of the Ordinance would be reviewed. Information about offcampus Fraternity/Sorority houses will become part of freshman orientation.

The next meeting is targeted for early February.

## **Your Policy of Insurance**

he college kids have flocked home for Thanksgiving, bringing dirty laundry and unaccustomed late nights to Mom and Dad. College is an exciting time of change for both children and parents, and insurance is rarely a topic of consideration. If your student takes his or her own car to school, it should be covered either on the parents' auto policy or a separate policy in the student's name.

If Junior heads back to school without his own vehicle, there are a couple things to keep in mind. First, if the child is listed as a driver on the parents' policy, they may be entitled to an "away at school" discount, reflecting the fact that the student will not be using their autos while away at school. Some companies allow this discount only if the student is more than 100 miles away at school. Ask your insurance agent about this discount.

What if your child uses a vehicle belonging to a roommate or friend while away at college? The friend's insurance policy would be the primary coverage in the event of an accident; however, the parents' policy would provide a second layer of protection in case there was no coverage, or not enough coverage, on the vehicle in question. But wait! There is an exclusion on the personal auto policy for a claim arising out of the use of an auto that is "furnished or available" for the "regular use" of a family member. In other words, if your daughter's roommate says she can use her car anytime she wants, and your daughter has an accident, your auto policy might exclude coverage because the car was furnished and available for your

always, it is a good idea to check with your agent.

Besides the obvious driving hazards facing your college student, there are also risks associated with your child's personal property. What about Junior's personal belongings in the dorm room? If your child is a member of your household when not away at school, there is some coverage on the parents' homeowners policy. There is a limitation, however, of 10 percent of the personal property limit for property "usually located" at an insured's "residence", other than the residence premises. In other words, if you have a \$50,000 personal property limit on your homeowners policy, your student has \$5,000 on her belongings at school. If the 10 percent rule does not provide enough coverage, you can either increase the limit on your policy, or you might explore purchasing a renter's policy for your child, especially if she is living in an off-campus apart-

As always, consult your local independent insurance agent and make sure you and your family have the coverage you need before a loss occurs!



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

n addition to the explanation of the new school attendance zones (pg. 1), the School Committee also focused on the following:

- Dennis Libby was re-elected as chairman and Roger Marchand was re-elected as vice chairman.
- Kyle Currier, Norm Justice and Principal Brian Porter will be representing the schools' interests in discussions as Gorham Trails Land Trust builds a nature trail around Village School. The trail starts in Buxton, goes through Gorham and will end in Westbrook.
- Town Manager David Cole requested permission to use the spruce tree, located in the circle at Narragansett School, as the town's lighted tree. The tree used in previous years was removed as part of the storm water retention project. In future years, the large spruce tree located near the public safety building will be used, but is currently in a construction zone.
- Superintendent Ted Sharp encouraged people to watch last week's School Talk featuring GMS Principal Bob Riley, Nutrition Director Michael Sanborn and Heather Whitaker, founder of the GMS garden project.

- Two focus points included a history of the garden project and the work of students, families and citizens to expand the garden.
- Superintendents from Sebago
  Educational Alliance are expected

## **BRIDGES' Maiden Voyage**

Gorham High School's BRIDGES program have been busy building a mini-sailboat through the Compass Project's Math and Science through Boat Building program.

The boat, named BRIDGES after GHS's alternative education program, along with three other boats from other schools, will be leaving on an unmanned voyage across the Atlantic in November. Each boat is tracked with GPS equipment, and the first to reach Longitude 20 West, or approximately 100 miles from Europe, will win the race.

A ceremonial sea trial was held in late October and the boat will soon be on its way to the North Caribbean by way of the Brazilian freighter, Finella. The mini-sailboat will be launched into the Gulf Stream and follow trade winds to Europe.

While students track the boat's progress, they will receive lessons in science involving ocean currents and predicting when and where the boat will make landfall, and in history and geography by learning about possible locations where the boat could land.

In addition to building a minisailboat, students are also building a twelve-foot rowing Bevin's skiff. Their progress is outlined in their student-created blog, www.bridgesboat. blogspot.com.



the trucks were blocking the view of turning traffic creating a safety issue.

A second Public Hearing was conducted to amend the Streets and Sidewalks Ordinance to add Robie, Lincoln, and Preble Streets to an existing list of streets where 3-, 4- and 5-axle trucks would be prohibited. The Council voted in favor of this amendment

A third Public Hearing was conducted to consider adopting revisions to the General Assistance Ordinance so that the new state maximum levels of assistance are reflected in the Town's General Assistance Ordinance. The Council voted in favor of the revisions.

In other actions, the Council:

- Voted 6-1 (Miner) to amend the Land Use and Development Code to allow gasoline stations in the Little Falls and Gorham Village districts to advertise fuel prices in LED lighting. The Ordinance Committee will review and make a recommendation.
- Voted 7-0 to refer a proposal to the Ordinance Committee to reword "non-resident" and "officer of the fraternity" in the ordinance to regulate

- fraternity and sorority houses.
- Voted 7-0 to refer a proposal to the Ordinance Committee to amend the Town's Shoreland Zoning Ordinance by withdrawing approval of the Town's Shoreland Zoning Map.
- Voted 7-0 to accept an easement for a fire pond in North Branch Brook Subdivision off Fillions Way, which is off Files Road.
- Voted 7-0 to authorize the town manager to sign an agreement to modify the bypass agreement, which stated the town will maintain streetlights and provide winter maintenance for the park-and-ride facility. The approval is conditional upon the State mouse proofing all lights and replacing existing streetlights with LED lights at the three roundabouts and the park-and-ride lot.
- Voted 7-0 to approve the recommendation to appoint Mary Collins to the Baxter Memorial Library Board of Trustees. Her term will expire April 1, 2011.

# Early Release Days Provide a Different Perspective on Learning

Whithin our school calendar each year, there are a finite number of early release days. In the past, Gorham Middle School ran a regular day of classes on these days, although classes were shortened to approximately fifteen minutes, making for a frenetic day for students and teachers.

Last year, we decided we needed to make a change and created a series of school-wide and themebased events for our school on early release days. To date we have created a Public Safety Day, a Charities Day, a Diversity Day, a Career Day and a Wellness Day. Each has brought community groups and individual citizens into our school to present information and engage our students in meaningful learning experiences.

On October 28, we held our second annual Public Safety Day. We had presenters from the Gorham Police Department offering sessions on "the professional life of a detective," accident reconstruction, drug awareness and good decision-making. Other presenters included the Gorham and Portland Fire Departments, as well as groups such as National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), FBI, Cumberland County Sheriff's office and the U.S. Marshalls' department.

We ask all our presenters—no matter the theme of the day—to share their educational background; what excites them about their work; how and what our students may want to know about what they do; and how they use reading, writing, math, history and science in their work. We hope that through these events our students develop aspirations for their future, a renewed motivation for their learning, and an enhanced sense of what it means to be an involved citizen in their community.

Later this year, a number of our early release days will be devoted to community service. Through our new advisory

program, our students are identifying ways in which they can contribute to the school, local and global communities through student-led community service projects. 


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
