Shawn Moody's Campaign Reflections Sarah Gavett-Nielsen

hawn Moody recently completed his campaign for governor of Maine, and although he did not win, he looks back on the experience with little regret. He feels blessed that he had the resources to campaign and wishes that everyone could have the opportunity to experience it. Moody states, "It's a wonderful experience. It's a tremendous learning opportunity." Moody enjoyed traveling throughout the state while on the campaign trail and valued the opportunity to meet with business and community leaders.

Moody was inspired to run for governor after the recent banking crisis that prompted the government to bail out banks and mortgage lenders. Moody felt the government contradicted the definition of capitalism. Capitalism, he said, is supposed to be based on competition that benefits the consumer, but it was ultimately the big companies who benefited. Moody stated, "by allowing these companies

to get too big to fail, in my mind, the government failed the people. Capitalism without conscience or consideration is a strained system." Moody wanted to run for governor to give the citizens of Maine the choice to vote for someone who would take the initiative to make a difference. He stated, "We need people involved in politics and in our government with high integrity and a proven track record of doing things right."

Moody would consider running for office again if the campaign promises made in this election do not come to fruition. "We need to hold our elected officials accountable," said Moody. In hindsight of his recent run for governor, Moody would resolve to be more aware in a future race of his need to persuade voters that his proposed plans will work successfully in the event of his election.

Moody felt there was a strong opportunity toward the end of the

"We are pleased to welcome several new performers who will join many of last year's favorites to present an extraordinary New Year's Eve Celebration for this community. Dana Perkins and his Friends, the Granite State Traveling Zoo, Mad Science and Brandon Baines will entertain families with young children at the Municipal Center. While at the same time, Karen Morgan, who is also known as Maine's Funniest Mom, will entertain an older audience at the Odd Fellows Building. The Gorham Community Chorus and Nate Marcet's Brass Quartet will join the list of performers featured at the First Parish Congregational Church, while another group will celebrate with Cattle Call country and western music at Galilee Baptist Church. And this is only a brief preview of a fabulous fun-filled town-wide celebration."

"We are especially excited to welcome to the High School's Gorham Performing Arts Center, a spectacular show of magic, illusions, and juggling with Magic of The Steelgraves," said Cindy Hazelton who is the director of the Gorham Rec. Dept. and a member of the New Year Gorham Committee. "Brandon Baines will get our audience warmed up before the magic begins, and the fun will continue afterward with dancing to Common Ground Band in the high school gym."

New Year Gorham's chairperson, Virginia Wilder Cross added, "Gorham's own Dave Eid (also known for his sports reporting for WGME-TV) will help us welcome

midnight, along with Autumn Heil, who created our beautiful countdown compass. And, we will begin 2011 with a fabulous fireworks show, specifically choreographed to highlight Autumn's compass and the crowd's countdown.

"We are extremely fortunate to have such strong community support for this event," Wilder Cross continued, "Local businesses and individuals contributed generously to sponsor much of our entertainment, which allowed us to keep the cost of admission affordable for all. A button allows admission to everything, as well as access to New Year Gorham transportation between venues in a horse-drawn wagon or in the comfort of a wheel-chair accessible van. Because many of the performances are centralized in the Village area, people will find it easy to walk between several of the shows.

Today's Public Health Crisis, Tomorrow's Epidemic Rep. Linda Sanborn

ne in eight Americans age 65 and older have Alzheimer's disease while one American develops Alzheimer's every 70 seconds. With the impending retirement of the Baby Boomers (the first Baby Boomer turns 65 on January 1, 2011), this number is expected to increase in the future. With Maine having the oldest population in the country it is clear that state policymakers can no longer ignore this devastating disease.

While the number of deaths from other serious diseases - including heart disease, prostate cancer, breast cancer and stroke - are decreasing, the number of deaths from Alzheimer's disease is increasing. Alzheimer's is the most common form of dementia that steals a person's memories, judgment and independence.

The financial impact on families is large as nearly 10 million Americans provide unpaid care for a person with Alzheimer's or other dementia, a contribution valued at \$144 billion in 2009. American businesses suffer indirect losses from lost productivity, missed work, and replacement expenses of employees who are unpaid caregivers. People with Alzheimer's disease are high users of hospitals, nursing home and other long-term care services resulting in high costs to Medicaid, Medicare and other payers totaling an estimated \$172 billion in 2010.

So what does Maine need to do to address this pending epidemic? I was fortunate to be one of three Maine legislators to recently attend an "Alzheimer's Summit" put on by the Chairman's Leadership Forum. I was surprised to learn that Maine is one of the states without a state plan. A comprehensive state strategy is necessary to address a range of issues including quantifying the number of individuals with Alzheimer's in the state, availability of diagnostic services, dementia-capable support services for people with all stages of disease, planning for long-term care, and safety of individuals who wander. I am happy

to report that Maine passed "Silver Alert" legislation last session to help immediately locate dementia patients who have wandered.

There have been breakthroughs in research, which have occurred by understanding some relationships between Alzheimer's and Downs Syndrome as well as rheumatoid arthritis. We need to invest in research and development of a cure and Maine has some great research resources to call

Adult guardianship issues commonly arise in situations involving snowbirds, long-distance care giving arrangements and interstate health markets. Maine needs to adopt the "Uniform Adult Guardianship and Protective Proceedings Jurisdiction Act" to establish a set of rules simplifying the process for determining jurisdiction between multiple states and allowing court judges in different states to communicate with each other.

We must promote brain health, as primary prevention is the ultimate public health strategy. Research has emerged showing that healthy living, including regular physical activity and attention to heart health, not only helps to avoid cardiovascular conditions, but may also benefit an individual's cognitive health. We must develop best practices aimed at early detection and risk reduction of co-morbid conditions in individuals with Alzheimer's. We must take bold action to confront this epidemic.





campaign for an independent to make an impact. He applauded Elliot Cutler for pulling in a substantial number of votes from previously undecided voters so close to election time. Chief Shepard Reports

he Grand Jury returned the following indictments in November:

- Patrick Hutton, 23, of Gorham was charged with two counts of unlawful sexual contact, aggravated assault, violating conditions of release and criminal attempted gross sexual assault on charges brought by Gorham Police Department.
- Eric Laudermilk, 30, of Windham was charged with eluding an officer, aggravated habitual offender, reckless conduct with a dangerous weapon (two counts), violating conditions of release and criminal speed. Charges were filed by Gorham and Portland Police Departments following a high speed chase in both communities.
- Nicholas O'Brien, 28, of Portland was charged with theft (priors) on

- charges brought by Gorham Police Department.
- Thomas Petty, 28, of South Portland was charged with theft (priors) on charges brought by Gorham Police Department.

The Gorham Police Department received a grant from the Maine Warden Service to enforce ATV laws, including no drinking and driving, not being reckless, having vehicles registered, and not using them on roadways. This grant pays overtime costs for officers to enforce laws pertaining to ATV usage.

The Gorham Police Department also received a \$4,800 OUI grant from the Bureau of Highway Safety to pay overtime costs for increased patrols to crack down on drunk drivers during the months of December and January.

Lettuce Be Healthy Barbara T. Schneider

s the year comes to a close, I reflect on all the happenings that have brought me to the doorstep of 2011. Remember when you heard your parents lament the swift passage of time as you were growing up? Well, it's true. The years do seem to fly by as one gets older, reminding us that the tried and true, classic things in life are what you rely on. It is comforting to have your routine, be it a holiday tradition or just going about your daily life. This certainly applies to routines in the kitchen, too. I rely on some old, dependable recipes from my mother and others whenever I need a sparkling centerpiece dish to please a crowd or for just family.

The first recipe, a classic Texas Hash, can be used as a main course or to stuff peppers or squash. Add any kind of vegetables you have on hand; use brown rice or even lentils. This recipe can morph into almost anything.

The second dish is an easy Moussaka made with ground lamb and a colorful array of vegetables. Paired it with a simple green salad, for a unique and tasty offering.

The Apple Cake is a 'go to' recipe that I have used for almost 35 years. It is not your typical two layer or Bundt cake.

All these recipes are "keepers," trusted heirlooms to please family and friends. Enjoy your holiday traditions!

Texas Hash

1 lb. ground beef or sausage 3 large onions, chopped 1 large green pepper, chopped 1 16 oz. can diced tomatoes 1/2 cup uncooked basmati rice 2 teaspoons chili powder Water if necessary (shouldn't be) Salt & pepper to taste 4 cloves garlic, chopped (optional)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Brown beef, onions, and peppers. Drain. Add tomatoes, garlic, tomatoes, rice chili pepper, salt and pepper. Pour into ungreased casserole dish; bake one hour.

Moussaka

2 tablespoons canola oil 4 shallots, chopped

2 leeks, chopped 1 eggplant, chopped

4 garlic cloves, chopped

1 green pepper, chopped

2 carrots, chopped

1/2 cup dry red wine

2-3 cups tomato sauce 2 pounds ground lamb Salt & pepper to taste 2 tablespoons Italian seasoning Spray butter or 2 tablespoons butter/

1 large baking potato or turnip or rutabaga, sliced very thin Paprika for top of casserole

Sauté leeks in oil for a few minutes, add garlic, green peppers, carrots and eggplant; let cook until tender. Add red wine; simmer until almost absorbed. Leaving drippings in the pot, remove vegetables to a bowl and set aside. Place lamb in pot and brown, season with salt and pepper. Remove from heat and add remaining seasonings and tomato sauce. Return eggplant mixture to pot. Spray 9x13 lasagna pan with butter spray (or Pam). Line bottom of pan with potato or substitute. Spoon lamb filling evenly over layers. Repeat layering with slices and eggplant mixture, ending with slices. Spray top layer with canola or butter spray, sprinkle with paprika. Bake for about 45 minutes, until brown and crisp. Great party dish.

Apple Cake

3 cups flour

2 cups sugar

4 eggs

1 cup oil

1/2 cup orange juice

3 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

2 1/2 teaspoons vanilla

1/2 teaspoon salt

5-6 green apples, peeled and sliced into quarter inch slices

3-4 teaspoons cinnamon

6-8 tablespoons sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix first eight ingredients in bowl until well blended. Mix cinnamon and sugar in small bowl. Into a well-greased and floured tube pan, layer 1/3 of batter, 1/3 of the apple slices, then 1/3 of the cinnamon sugar mixture. Repeat, ending with cinnamon sugar. Bake for at least 1 1/4 hours, test for doneness. Try adding ground or chopped hazelnuts and a drizzle of caramel topping when cool.


Students from both organizations hope to join forces again next year. In the meantime, "Takin' It To The

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
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Ready, Set, Cross!

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


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
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
