Meet the New Superintendent of Gorham Schools

A native of northern Maine, Heather Perry brought her informal style and passion for educational excellence south to Gorham, where she is the district's new superintendent. Perry, eager to learn more about her new community, has been "listening and learning" since early July when she succeeded retired superintendent Ted Sharp.

After receiving a degree in history from the University of Maine at Machias, Perry took a job as an ed. tech in 1996. In ten years she moved from ed. tech to teacher, teaching-principal, principal, and superintendent, all in rural districts where sometimes there were "more moose than students." After four years as superintendent of the Greenville district, the last three in combination with Jackman, in 2010 she became superintendent of RSU 3. The Unity-based district has 10 member communities spread over 400 square miles, which required her to seek out many perspectives to understand what people wanted from their schools.

Perry, 41, brings that openness and experience to Gorham while still striving to improve her professional skills. She has master's degree from the University of Maine and is completing a doctorate in educational

leadership. Reading and studying consume much of her spare time, but she also enjoys attending sporting events—she already has her Rams t-shirt. Coming from the rural north, she looks forward to enjoying this area's cultural riches with her husband and daughter. Perry's husband, Peter, is still in Greenville, but will be joining her soon. Her daughter, Katie,

is a sophomore accounting major at the University of Maine-Augusta.

Gorham has nearly twice the number of students and twice the budget as RSU 3. In the past, Perry has worked successfully to develop budgets that voters supported. Limited resources in Washington County gave her experience in getting the most out of each education dollar. She also is used to "wearing many hats" and knows she will need to delegate more to a larger support staff. Education, however, is a collaborative effort. She places a high value on understanding community needs. Just because something works in one community does not mean it will in another.

Perry is committed to maintaining clear standards. She believes strongly in "transparency about expectations for teachers, students, and parents." More important than high-stakes testing, where data is useful only if limited and timely, is on-going formative and summative evaluation. "Daily feedback to students helps them meet standards, as does creative summative evaluation, which could be videos or performances in addition to traditional tests." Her belief in on-going learning and collaboration has made her an advocate for staff development. "I really support creating learning time built into a teacher's day and giving teachers opportunities to collaborate." Perry's understanding that "all schools have a set of themes, beliefs, and vision" will guide her in building on Gorham's strengths in seeking new ways for the district to grow and improve.

Food is Medicine

In the fall of 2013, the Maine Council on Aging, or MCOA, in partnership with Maine Speaker of the House Mark Eves, began exploring the economic impact of our aging population, and how to best meet the housing, transportation and care needs of our older residents.

MCOA and Eves launched the Maine Aging Initiative in March of 2014, which created the Legislative Caucus on Aging to work on innovative ways to help older adults age safely and independently in their communities.

I have gladly been part of all of these discussions. A direct result of this work was LD 831, a bill I sponsored to expand access to home-delivered meals for Mainers who are homebound. This bill targets elderly or disabled Mainers with the goal of providing nutritious meals that can expedite the transition from hospital to home and decrease the risk of readmission.

Good nutrition is necessary for healing. As stated in a publication by Harvard's Center for Health Law and Policy Innovation, "For critically and chronically ill people, food is medicine. With adequate amounts of nutritious food, people who are sick

have a better response to medication, maintain and gain strength, and have improved chances of recovery. Ultimately, access to healthy food leads to improved health outcomes and lower health care costs."

Last year, over 4,400 older Mainers and adults with disabilities received home-delivered meals through the Meals on Wheels program administered by the Area Agencies on Aging. A recent study by Meals on Wheels America found that individuals receiving home-delivered meals showed improved mental health, a reduction in the rate of falls and reduced feelings of loneliness and isolation.

Maine is the oldest state in the country by median age. There are more than 250,000 adults over the age of 65, and 30 percent of seniors live alone. Thirty-seven percent of older adults are disabled.

We know that, overwhelmingly, our elders want to remain home and avoid higher-cost assisted living, nursing home or hospital care. Helping to keep them home will improve their quality of life and save the state money.

During the bill's public hearing, the bill received strong support from advocates for older Mainers. Judy Rawlings, a member of the MCOA

Board of Directors, testified that 5.46 percent of Maine seniors, or about 14,350 people, are food insecure. Rawlings explained that many seniors do not have sufficient funds to purchase enough food, some can no longer drive to get the food they need and still others simply can no longer prepare their own meals.

This bill passed unanimously in the Health and Human Services Committee, easily in both the House and Senate and became law without the governor's signature. Funding was accomplished in the biennial budget to avoid the governor's promised veto.

Here in Gorham, the importance of making Gorham an "Age Friendly Community" has been part of many local conversations, and we need to keep working towards this goal. Dear *Gorham Times* Editor:

No child should be exposed to chemicals that cause cancer, reproductive problems, or learning disabilities. Sadly, children face serious health threats every day from toxic chemicals in household products that are linked to these health problems and so many more. The broken Toxic Substances Control Act of 1976 has allowed almost all 80,000 chemicals in commerce to enter the market with little or no safety review. Under this law, only four chemicals have been banned.

The good news is that Congress agrees that reform is long overdue. Unfortunately, the bill (S.697) before the US Senate would take at least eight years to only review 25 chemicals. Worse, the bill would prevent states from taking action on chemicals while the federal government is reviewing

them. In Maine, the Kid Safe Product Act of 2008 allows our state to keep families safe from the worst of the worst chemicals. We shouldn't limit Maine's authority to act while the federal government continues to delay action.

A better bill (HR 2576) just passed the House almost unanimously; while not perfect, it preserves state authority to take action on toxic chemicals, and would review a greater number of chemicals for safety in a shorter time-frame than the Senate bill.

We need reform that truly protects our health from toxic chemicals. Congress should work off of the House bill, and add the stronger elements of the Senate bill to it. Our Senators, Susan Collins and Angus King, will be key to ensuring the passage of real reform.

The town of Gorham officially sold the property at 21 Main Street to Amatos, whose plan is to demolish the building to provide additional parking and create a right-turn exit onto Route 25. The town of Gorham issued permits for 12 new single-family homes in June and an additional 18 in July.

For the Love of People

A Profile of Gorham House Executive Director

This particular Monday morning Michelle Belhumeur, executive director of the Gorham House, is finding it a challenge to finish her daily rounds of all the units in the retirement community. Not that she minds. "I love helping out the staff and I don't mind getting my hands dirty," says Belhumeur. Laundry, from early morning bed changing, is piling up faster than the staff is capable of doing, so Belhumeur gathers up the soiled linens and throws them down the laundry chute to help the busy staff. Later, Belhumeur helps one of her employees comfort a resident in the Memory Care Unit who is agitated and anxious, by taking her for a walk outside and treating her to coffee cake in the employee lounge until she is seemingly comforted and content. Following her rounds, it's back to the office for the overall operation and financial part of her job; it may not be her favorite part, but when Belhumeur says she loves her job and loves her relationship with her staff and residents, there is no doubt she means it.

Born and raised in Manville, Rhode Island, Belhumeur, who is married with two grown children, earned a degree in social work from Rhode Island College. She has lived in Gorham for 22 years and started her career at the Gorham House as a part-time social worker 16 years ago, but her passion for healthcare started long before then. Throughout high school and college, Belhumeur worked in housekeeping at a nearby retirement home, working her way up to laundry, then as a dietary aide, and she even drove residents to doctor's appointments.

A year after working in the Rehab Unit of the Gorham House, she was promoted to director of the Assisted Living Center. "At first I didn't want the promotion," explains Belhumeur with a chuckle, "I didn't want the responsibility of supervising 45 employees. I didn't want to be removed from the residents, because that's where my heart lies. But my supervisor saw something in me that I didn't see in myself."

Six years later, Belhumeur was offered the job as executive director overseeing 230 employees. "I really needed a kick in the pants when that opportunity came along, because finance was not my thing," says Belhumeur. Nine years later

Belhumeur has found a comfortable balance between operations and the social worker she is at heart.

There are eight "neighborhoods" at the Gorham

House. Independent Living (residents are completely independent and come and go as they please), Independent Living with meals and laundry included, Assisted Living (care available 24 hours a day), Memory Care Unit, Long-Term Care, Rehabilitation Unit, Psychiatric Unit

and finally, the Preschool, where volunteer residents are called Grandfriends. "The general public thinks residents who move to Gorham House get depressed," explains Belhumeur, "but it's just the opposite. There is so much that happens here every single day. Our residents dress up to go to dinner, they're eating healthier and they have many more friends. They blossom here."

Quite literally the sky is the limit as to what the residents in this community can do outside of the center—from jumping out of airplanes, to horseback riding and archery. Two very well attended events are summer theater in Ogunquit and casino night at Oxford Casino. "Every unit has their own activity director and the residents of these units [or "neighborhoods" as they are now being referred to] determine what they want to do," says Belhumeur. "I train my staff to get to know their residents and provide them with what they like and work with what they dislike."

In the industry of nursing homes and assisted living facilities, Gorham House is very proud of the training their staff receives with end-of-life issues. "We certainly don't go

to parties and brag about it," says Belhumeur, "but dying is a part of the circle of life and we don't want to run from it either. We [Gorham House] are good at the final circle; it's a special time that we can help someone ease through a comfortable and dignified death." This is why Gorham House also offers funeral services along with catering in the Great Room of the facility.

Belhumeur hopes you will visit their resident-run Itsy Bitsy Store, which is open to the public every first and third Tuesday of the month from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. (Donations of costume jewelry, all-occasion cards, knitted and crocheted items gratefully accepted.) Function rooms at Gorham House are available for parties, showers and gatherings. A craft fair with over 40 vendors is held in the building on the first weekend in November.

Goodbye, Child Care Costs ... Hello, College Savings Opportunities

If you are a working parent, you know firsthand about the difficulties of finding quality, affordable care for your children. But eventually, your kids head off to school, and those child care bills go away, or at least diminish greatly. When that happens, you could start putting away money for another of your child's milestones: college.

Just how expensive is child care? Costs vary greatly among the 50 states, but the national average for a four-year-old at a child care center is approximately \$7,880 per year, according to Child Care Aware of America, a child care resource and referral agency sponsored by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. What could you do with this money once your child enters kindergarten?

Of course, not all schools provide all-day kindergarten, so you still may have some child care costs. For the purposes of illustration, let's presume you can finally say "goodbye" to child care costs when your child is in first grade, and let's also assume your child is attending a public school. If you invested that \$7,880 every year for 12 years, until your child reaches 18, you could accumulate more than \$150,000 in a tax-advantaged college savings

account, such as a 529 plan--assuming the money was placed in a hypothetical investment that earned seven percent per year. Keep in mind, though, that the word "hypothetical" means exactly that, because whenever you put money in any variable investment, there are no guarantees.

Earnings in a 529 plan accumulate and are distributed tax free, provided they are used for qualified higher education expenses. Also, 529 plan distributions not used for qualified expenses may be subject to federal and state income tax and a 10 percent IRS penalty on the earnings. In addition, your 529 plan contributions may be deductible from your state taxes. However, 529 plans vary, so be sure to check with your tax advisor regarding deductibility.

A 529 plan offers other benefits, too. For one thing, the lifetime contribution limits are generous; while these limits vary by state, some plans allow contributions well in excess of \$200,000. And a 529 plan is flexible: If your child decides against college or vocational school, you can transfer the unused funds to another family member, tax and penalty free.

A 529 plan is a widely used choice for college savings, but it is not your only option. You could also consider a Coverdell Education Savings Account, which, like a 529 plan, can generate

tax-free earnings if the money is used for higher education expenses. You can typically only put in a maximum of \$2,000 per year to a Coverdell account, but it lets you use the funds on K-12 and college expenses.

Whichever college-savings vehicle you choose, it will take discipline on your part to continue investing in it, year after year. And after freeing yourself from those child care bills, you can certainly think of other ways to use this "found" money. That is why you might want to automatically move money from your checking or savings account to your 529 plan, Coverdell account or other investment earmarked for college. As your income rises over the years, you can increase the amount of these automatic transfers.

In any case, once those child care bills stop, you can put that money to work on your children's behalf. Make the most of this opportunity.



North Gorham is located where the Presumpscot River separates the towns of Windham and Gorham. Long a farming community, by the late 19th century the Great Falls dam had made possible a busy industrial area of saw mills, a pulpware factory, and an electric power plant. As was typical of growing Maine communities, residents considered a library as essential as a store or church, and, in 1896, the North Gorham Library Association used a \$600 bequest from the estate of Joseph Walker to establish one. The library occupied a small space in Forest Hall, site of most community activities. In 1918 the Association acquired Calab Smith's store across the street at the foot of North Gorham Road.

Staffed by local women, the library relied mainly on donations for books and on volunteers for building maintenance. Patrons paid annual dues of 50 cents. The town of Gorham contributed to the librarian's small salary. By mid-century the power station was the only reminder of an industrial past, but the area continued to be the heart of community life. Although the library was open only on Wednesdays, the second floor served as a hall for potluck suppers and meetings.

During the night of July 23, 1975 unknown arsonists set fire to the building. Warren Gilman, an 86-year-old life-long resident and the community's informal historian, remembers the volunteer fire department fighting the blaze and the efforts of Marge Skinner, the librarian, to save many of the water-damaged books from the ruins. The receipt of the insurance money, however, made possible an arrangement with the town of Gorham that, as Gilman recalled, enabled the library "to rise like a phoenix." The town added a room for the library to the fire station being built just up the hill. Volunteers furnished it, including applying many layers of protective coating to new bookshelves built with donated labor and materials. They cataloged hundreds of books given by friends and other libraries. "It never would have happened," Gilman said, "if all the volunteers had not worked so hard."

With the new library, fire station and UCC church, located in the former Levi Hall School, the center of the community moved to the corner of North Gorham Road and Standish Neck Road.

To qualify for benefits from the state, the library was now open 11 hours a week. Patrons no longer paid dues; the library was free to all. Over the years dedicated librarians, who still work for very modest pay, have provided resources and programming to meet changing community needs. Library patrons, mainly from northeast Gorham and eastern Standish, participate in a book discussion group, a writers' group, talks by local authors, and programs for children. Funds come from book and plant sales, special project appeals, and gifts. Gorham financial support goes mainly to salaries. The town heats and maintains the public building.

Downing Brothers Lead the Way for Gorham in 18th Beach to Beacon 10K

The Gorham 9U Cal Ripken All-Star Baseball Team won the Maine state championship in mid-July and then went on to finish third in the New England Regional Tournament in early August. This was the second year in a row that the 9U team won the state championship, and five players were on both teams—CJ Whitehead, Quinn Dillon, Malachi Scribner, Caden Smith and Noah Flynn.

The team was chosen from rosters of the Gorham Cal Ripken League town teams. Gorham was one of 16 towns competing in the Maine tournament and won all five of its games. About the Killdeer

At Narragansett School in May there were killdeer that laid eggs on the playground. Students kept the bird eggs safe and learned more about them. They learned the killdeer prefers to lay eggs on gravel. The eggs are about an inch and a half long, and they are tan with blackish brown marks. It takes about 20 to 24 days for the eggs to hatch.

Sometimes the mother killdeer lies on one side and pretends she has a broken wing. She does the broken

wing act to keep the predators away from the nest.

Tri-ing for a Cure—Behind the Scenes

Many Gorham residents join in every year to fight cancer by participating in the annual Tri for a Cure triathlon. But the team of Kelly and Brian Ferrigan have also helped out in a major way—by taking care of a lot of the behind-the-scenes activities that are necessary for such an event to support the 1,000-plus who participate every year.

Kelly, who also works at the Dance Studio of Maine, has been an assistant volunteer director for six years while her husband Brian has been the parking and traffic control coordinator for three years. “I first got involved after watching my mother participate in the second Tri for a Cure in 2009,” says Ferrigan. “I was so inspired watching all the survivors in the opening ceremony and so impressed with how well Julie Marchese (one of the original founders) ran all the activities that I wanted to help out too.”

Ferrigan’s mother, Paula Vokey of Portland, was competing to honor her mother who at that point was a cancer survivor. Since that time, Vokey’s mother and father (Ferrigan’s grandparents) have both passed away after battling cancer. “My mother did not compete this year but has in past years as part of a relay team,” Ferrigan says. “It’s an honor to keep volunteering in recognition of her efforts and in memory of my grandparents. Brian and I both feel lucky to serve in our roles.”

The roles Kelly and Brian fulfill present major challenges. Tri for a Cure relies on more than 500 volunteers each year. Kelly manages volunteers on the run course as well as those who help with parking, traffic control and water stations.

When adding in the more than 1,000 participants and all those who come to support them, that’s a lot of cars for Brian to coordinate parking for across the Southern Maine Community

College campus where the event is held each year. “Brian’s biggest concern is safety,” Ferrigan says. “He needs to make sure all the participants can easily navigate between events.”

Ferrigan also shares that Tri for a Cure represents much more to her and Brian than just an event. “In addition to losing both of my grandparents to cancer, my stepmother, who I am very close with, is a breast cancer survivor and is the Navigation Nurse at the Breast Center at Mercy Hospital. And my father and Brian’s mother were both diagnosed with cancer earlier this year.”

“It’s thus a special a privilege to be part of the Gorham community that’s involved in this event, which is one of the largest fundraisers in the state,” Ferrigan adds. “2015 was once again an amazing year. The athletes, volunteers and everyone involved continue to inspire us. Each year we leave with a great feeling of how wonderful people can be. What Julie Marchese and the Maine Cancer Foundation have created is like nothing else, and we feel honored to be a part of it.”

and Lloyd is very excited about the new location, saying “I know we will be dancing!”

Special needs dance classes will be held on the first floor and GAA can use the second floor for plays. Second floor sprinklers were installed at the GAA building this month.

Lloyd has been in her current location for 33 years and purchased the building in 2004. The building is approximately 200 years old and was a Grange Hall for many years. It has an assessed value of \$238,600.

In recent years, the Gorham Fire Department found a number of deficiencies in the building. They advised Lloyd that the deficiencies needed to be corrected and a sprinkler system needed to be installed on all three floors along with a direct alarm to the Fire Department. The Centre would also be

required to hook into to a special water system. Lloyd estimated the cost of the improvements to be between \$80,000 and \$100,000.

Linda Whitten, whose daughter danced at the Centre for many years, spearheaded a number of fundraising activities, assisted by approximately 25 other people who helped. Some required repairs were done but the fundraisers were unable to raise enough money in a relatively short period of time, so Lloyd reluctantly decided to sell the property and move around the corner.

“I appreciate every single person who has given their time, made donations, worked on the building and who are following us around the corner” said Lloyd. “I have had wonderful support.”

Lloyd expects to start moving on September 1 and open for business on September 8. There will be an open house once the new space is ready.

Jon Smith of Great Falls Construction currently has the building under contract. Smith declined to comment on his plans for the property.

With the help of volunteers, the library is open Monday and Thursday afternoons from 3 to 5:30, Wednesday from 6 to 8 p.m., and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Caregivers bring toddlers and babies to story hour on Wednesday morning at 10; storytime also goes on the road to local home day-care facilities during the school year.

Libraries everywhere are adapting to new technologies and new uses, and this is as true in North Gorham as it is in larger places. Recently, the library removed some bookshelves to make room for computers and meeting space. It maintains an online catalog, website and Facebook page. Because more patrons read e-books and get information online, the library keeps fewer books in its small space, but provides easy access to many more through interlibrary loan. There is cooperative programming with Baxter Memorial Library, a separate organization.


