Along with Pandemic, Class of 2021 Graduates Close Another Chapter

It was early June on the Gorham High School (GHS) football field, and, for the first time in over a year, the GHS Class of 2021 were all together for the first day of marching practice, preparation for one of the most significant moments of these students' lives: high school graduation.

The entire class was a bit antsy and eager to speak with friends whom for months, due to Covid-19, they may have only seen over a screen. Yet, they remained in the sweltering heat and practiced. Sit here, stand next to this person—no not them, walk faster, walk slower, etc.


By Sunday, June 13, all 204 graduates were lined up outside the GHS bus loop, peering over the fence to the football field where over 1,000 community members and family were gathered in the stands awaiting the ringing first note of "Pomp and Circumstance." The graduation procession was led by class marshals Tess Libby and Tatiana Jonk.

The Class of 2021 certainly learned perseverance having spent 40 percent of their high school career either quarantined or in a hybrid schooling model. The ceremony not only honored GHS students' dedication to their academics but to their own wellbeing and the health of their community during the unprecedented time.

Class salutatorian, Nathan Eichner, highlighted resilience in his speech. "I want to focus on what each one of us has been gifted during this pandemic: resilience. In some way or another, we all had to accustom ourselves to an advanced level of communication when talking with teachers or even when advocating for ourselves. It is not easy to speak up when you are participating in class on Zoom. Whatever they may have been, we were faced with an array of setbacks that shattered the definitive normal high school experience."

It seems clear that in the past year, many students experienced personal loss, dwindling motivation, health issues of their own, and faced innumerable other barriers. In her address to the class, valedictorian and class president Emily Paruk spoke on this fracture and the healing power of gratitude.

Celebrate PRIDE 2021

The Library of Congress defines Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ) Pride Month as "celebrations each year in the month of June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan which was a tipping point for the Gay Liberation Movement in the United States."

Since that date, hundreds of cities, towns, and states have continued to support the LGBTQIA+ community and celebrate in a variety of ways including parades, art displays, and festivals.



A five-striped chevron was added to the left side of the rainbow flag in 2018, representing LGBTQ+ people of color and the trans community. In 2021, the Progress Pride Flag received a revision to be more inclusive of intersex people. A purple circle superimposed over a yellow

Over the years since 1865, Juneteenth has become an annual celebration recognized in 47 states, including Maine in 2011. This June, the State Legislature made June 19 a paid holiday for state workers beginning in 2022, and on June 17 President Joe Biden signed the bill making Juneteenth a federal holiday. Unfortunately, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, most local celebrations were canceled last year and many again this year, including the popular PRIDE Parade in Portland.

"We have been monitoring the COVID-19 global pandemic situation closely and in consideration of the still-high case load in Maine, we have made the difficult decision to cancel the in-person pride parade and festival in Portland for 2021", https://prideportland.org/.

We're Taking Action to Address Child Hunger in Maine

One of the most pressing issues we're facing today in Maine is food insecurity. Though hunger can seem nonexistent to those who don't face it on a daily basis, it unfortunately is prevalent across Maine today, no matter what part of the state you're in.

The most upsetting instance of this is among our children. Maine currently has the highest rate of child hunger in New England, and one of the highest in the nation. When our kids are hungry, they can't focus in school and don't have the fuel they need to play and grow. This needs to change, and I'm proud to share that we have passed two bills in the Senate that will not only ensure every Maine student can get meals at school, but also that they have access to nutritious, local foods.

One of these bills is LD 1679, "An Act To Address Student Hunger through Expanding Access to Free School Meals," and is sponsored by my colleague, Senate President Troy Jackson. This bill would provide every student in Maine free school meals. It does so by providing the necessary funding to cover the difference between those who currently qualify under the National School Lunch Program, which is administered by the federal government, and all other Maine students. The federal government will continue providing these meals for all students through the 2022 school year, but this bill would make it permanent.

You might be wondering why we want to cover students who don't currently qualify for free or reduced priced meals under the federal guidelines. There are a couple reasons for this. First, students who receive free meals at school are often subjected to bullying and humiliation from their peers, so much so that it can cause them to skip getting the meal entirely.

Secondly, there may be students who just barely miss the federal cutoff, but who also struggle to receive consistent meals at home. Whatever the situation, making free meals the uniform policy will ensure that our kids aren't going hungry, and that they can learn to their fullest potential.

Another recent bill that we passed in the Senate is sponsored by Senate Majority Leader Eloise Vitelli. The bill, LD 636, "An Act To Encourage the Purchase of Local Foods for Public Schools," will get more local foods to our schools, while at the same time supporting local farmers and producers.

The bill expands on a current law that gets local produce to schools and would allow for dairy and protein products, in addition to produce, to be purchased through the program. The bill also increases the amount of money the state will match for schools purchasing these foods, and allows for food to be purchased from local distributors in addition to directly purchasing from farms.

After all we've been through, we need to do everything we can to support Maine farms. This bill is a win all around and will benefit our farmers, food producers and all Maine students.

Together, these two bills will make a real difference in the lives of Maine students. We have the ability to not only ensure our children can access meals at school, but to make sure they're getting high quality, local and nutritious food.

I'm pleased to share that these two bills received unanimous, bipartisan support in the Senate in initial votes, and I'm hopeful that we can send them to the desk of Gov. Mills in the near future.

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

Women Can Overcome Obstacles to Financial Security

While women have made great strides in social, economic, cultural and political realms, they still tend to encounter more obstacles than men in the pursuit of financial security. Let's consider a few of them.

To begin with, women are still more likely to leave the workforce, at least temporarily, to raise children, resulting in lower contributions to employer-sponsored retirement plans such as 401(k). Women are also often the ones who become full-time caregivers of aging parents or other relatives.

Caregiving duties can exact a big financial toll. The lost wages, pensions (including 401(k)s and similar plans) and Social Security benefits that a woman loses to become a full-time caregiver amount to more than \$300,000 over her lifetime, according to the National Academy of Sciences.

Women also may be more susceptible to financial downturns. Consider the

COVID-19 pandemic: Just a few months ago, in December, women lost 156,000 jobs, while men gained 16,000, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, which also reported that women accounted for 54% of the jobs lost from the pandemic in 2020.

Many women are aware of their circumstances and outlook. Just 41% of women are confident about retirement, compared with 56% of men, according to a survey by Edward Jones and Age Wave. Here are a few steps women can take to help improve their financial outlook.

Take full advantage of retirement plans. If you are still working and your employer offers a 401(k) or similar retirement plan, take full advantage of it. Put in as much as you can afford each year and increase your contributions when your salary goes up. Also, within your plan, you'll want to choose the mix of investments that can help provide the most growth potential, given your individual risk tolerance. Also, even if you contribute to a 401(k) or similar plan, you may also be eligible to fund an IRA, which gives you even more investment choices.

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Evaluate your Social Security options. You can typically start taking Social Security benefits when you're 62, but your monthly checks will be much larger if you wait until your "full" retirement age, which will likely be between 66 and 67. Also consider whether you'd be better off by taking spousal benefits, if you're married, and your spouse earned more money than you. You're generally even eligible for spousal benefits if you are divorced, as long as you were married at least 10 years and you haven't remarried.

Look for unexpected income opportunities. Even after you've formally retired, you may still find ways to receive some earned income. Perhaps you can work part time or do some consulting. And if you're a caregiver, you might be able to receive some compensation for your work. Many local governments pay non-spouse caregivers who act as personal attendants, although the rules vary greatly by state and county.

These certainly aren't the only ways you can improve your financial status, but they may prove useful to you. In any case, be aware of the challenges facing you and do whatever you can to brighten your future.







"And now we exit with pages filled behind us to look back on, filled with unique characters that made different impacts on our lives, and filled with lessons learned and wisdom gained. If there is one thing I know for sure all of us are walking out of here with is, well one, a diploma, but just as important, resiliency, and for that we can all feel a tremendous amount of gratitude. Because after everything, you are still standing, ready to walk into the next pages with your callused feet and tackle whatever else the world throws at you."

The Class of 2021 certainly learned perseverance having spent 40 percent of their high school career either quarantined or in a hybrid schooling model.

The Class of 2021 also welcomed Maine Senator and two-term governor, Angus King, who was making his first public appearance since the beginning of the pandemic. The Senator addressed the class as he laid out "Ten things I wish somebody had told me when I was 18."

This advice included remarks such as: take that risk, "see that you regret the things you did and not the things you didn't do," and "always carry a \$20 hidden somewhere on your person." King also discussed happiness expressing that "There is no geographic or material cure. If you are not happy in Gorham, ME, do not kid yourself: 'Oh, I'll be happy when I'm in Boston, or New York, or San Francisco.' No, you carry your happiness around between your ears."

The Class of 2021 exited the GHS football field on the evening of June 13 carrying these words of advice and a year's worth of grit, ready to approach the inevitable obstacles and joys that awaited them in the next phase of their lives.

This is How it Always Is, by Laurie Frankel

Rosie and Penn have four sons, and a few years later they have Claude. As soon as Claude is old enough to speak, he announces he wants to wear dresses and wants to know when he'll be a girl.

Rosie and Penn parent Claude the way they parent their older kids—accepting her for who she is and supporting her as she grows up.

Their home may be a home of acceptance and unconditional love, but outside lies a cruel, judgmental world.

What will Claude do? How will Rosie and Penn react to the pressures of society while protecting their child's inherent knowledge of who she is? How will Claude react to pressure from so many fronts?

I can't say much more about this book without giving things away that I strongly encourage you to read first-hand. What I CAN say is that Laurie Frankel has written a beautiful, enlightening book about a couple, a family, and a child who just wants to be themself.

Featuring a story-within-thestory of a fairy tale that Penn creates as a bedtime story for his kids—a story he adds to as the kids get older—This is How it Always Is one of the most thought-provoking, heartbreaking, and heartwarming books I have ever read.

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Free drop-in visit in June

School Committee Meeting 6/9/21

At their June 9 regular meeting, the School Committee (SC) thanked Zak Lembarra for his service as student representative, presented outgoing Assistant Superintendent Chris Record with a parting gift, and approved the appointment of Jodi Mezzanotte as principal of Village Elementary School.

Superintendent Heather Perry announced that physical distancing will not be required in schools in the fall. She said that the Maine Department of Education is waiting for federal government approval before releasing ESSER111 funding applications, and that the district is ready to apply. She reported that the curriculum audit work was completed across all content areas and grade levels, with a report to be released in October.

Perry expressed concern over filling ed tech and bus driver positions. She announced that Gorham voters passed the FY21 budget referendum the day before the meeting.

School Committee members joined her in thanking voters for their support and also expressed concern over personnel shortages. The district is advertising an eight-hour day for bus drivers and offering an earn-to-learn program as well as signing bonuses.

Record presented a Federal Title Grant review and plan for the 2021-22 school year. In preparation, he had met with the review team of administrators, laboratory and classroom teachers, and parents.

Title I covers K-5 literacy and math skills; Title II funds professional development and improving teaching and learning. The goals of Title IV relate to social and emotional needs, remediation, absenteeism, and helping the lowest 25% of learners.

Record will be submitting data collected regarding progress made on issues addressed by Title IV that will be included in the superintendent's state of the schools report.

Goals for 2021-22 include improving math skills and literacy in the lowest 25%, improving instructional practice, and helping meet students' social/emotional needs. Record included advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion, as well as continuing to implement the Anti-racism and Equity Policy.

The SC voted (7-0) to approve the Dropout Prevention Policy as well as authorizing transfer of budgeted funds of not more than 5% between cost centers.

They voted (6-1, Gagnan) to bring forward a proposed bond referendum to fund seven capital improvement projects not to exceed \$6.1 million. The referendum does not include any funds for Gorham Middle School expansion, but does revise costs for other projects due to estimate increases.

In personnel matters, the SC voted (7-0) to approve the appointment of Jodi Mezzanotte to be principal of Village Elementary School. She taught 5th grade and was assistant principal at Village prior to becoming an assistant superintendent in another district. They also voted to appoint Erica Woods as a K-5 ELL teacher. Penelope Coward as Village behavior program teacher, Sophia Hendrix for a one-year 2nd grade teacher position at Great Falls, and Jeff Burnap as 9-12 remote learning teacher. They approved Schedule B coaching personnel for fall sports.

Superintendent Perry reviewed the summary data for COVID quarantines and students sent home with possible symptoms, saying that the 298 number for K-5 numbers for students and staff were lower in the later part of May than earlier. There were 24 students and no staff recorded for grades 6-12. She noted the impact of vaccinations on numbers for staff. The district will offer vaccination clinics for grades 6-12 in the fall for eligible students.

Mezzanotte New Village **School Principal**

Jodi Mezzanotte, who spent more than ten years as a 5th grade teacher and assistant principal at Village Elementary School, is returning to the district to be the school's new principal, replacing Brian Porter, who was recently appointed assistant superintendent of Gorham Schools.

Mezzanotte earned both a B.A. and M.Ed from the University of Southern Maine. After leaving Gorham in 2016, she was assistant superintendent for Westbrook Schools for four years before serving in the same position for the South Portland School District.

"I am beyond excited to be back serving the Gorham community in the capacity of Village School principal," Mezzanotte said. "Gorham is a special place for me as I not only raised my family in Gorham, but started my career here. I look forward to working with the Village School team to continue their good work of creating a safe, comfortable and inclusive environment where all can learn and grow."

Outgoing principal Porter said he was "thrilled and excited" over Mezzanotte's return. "Jodi was pivotal in helping to establish a strong, positive culture at Village School as we became a new K-5 elementary school in 2011," he said.

In announcing Mezzanotte's appointment, Superintendent Heather Perry said she "brings a deep understanding of the needs of learners and is dedi-

cated to creating a learning environment where all can thrive." She cited Mezzanotte's community contributions and her participation in local service organizations.

Mezzanotte serves on two non-profit boards: Rising Sun Programs and The Dream Factory. Both are focused on supporting, educating, and mentoring students.

"She believes in shared leadership and builds strong relationships with students, staff, and the community," said Perry, who also praised Mezzanotte for her work ethic, passion, tireless commitment to excellence, and sense of humor.
