Gorham Business Exchange Making Changes to Support Local Businesses

Unable to hold its community events during the pandemic and responding to the financial toll COVID-19 took on Gorham businesses, the Board of the Gorham Business Exchange (GBE) voted to eliminate both membership dues and the paid executive director position. The nonprofit organization will continue to advocate for local businesses and is planning to resume public activities later this summer.

"We are still here," said Ethan Johnson, GBE board president and account executive for Chalmers Insurance Group. "But the pandemic leveled us. We did not feel right asking for dues from our hardhit businesses, and state guidelines forced us to cancel Marketplace in 2020 and again this year."

Nearly 30 years old, the GBE currently has just over 100 members who have been paying annual dues of \$95 which primarily funded the executive director's salary. With the reorganization, Suzanne Phillips, who held that position, joined the volunteer board. "We are keeping the phone number and the e-mail

blasts," she said, "and since we changed the dues policy I have had calls from ten potential members."

Since the GBE was founded in 1994, others in Gorham such as Kevin Jensen, Gorham director of economic development, and the Gorham Village Alliance have joined in the effort to promote local commercial interests. "We see our role as advocating for all business owners. The GBE lobbied the state legislature not to tax federal COVID relief for businesses," Johnson said.

The GHS Senior Internship Experience is a Success

Seniors at Gorham High School (GHS) wrapped up their two-week internship on June 4. Over the course of their 36-hour experience, seniors worked closely with community businesses and organizations to gain valuable on-the-job perspective and skills in a career they may pursue after high school or college.

This year, seniors interned with a wide range of businesses, including: Skolfield Sports Performance, 320 Ink, IDEXX, Flowfold, Atlantic Dance Arts, Village Physical Therapy, and many more. Seniors explored career interests ranging from interior design to civil engineering to speech pathology to law enforcement.

At CWS Architects, Sydney Fox was tasked with designing a beach house. She was invited to draw a floor plan, select design concepts, themes for each room, and was given the opportunity to choose interior materials like flooring, paint, and lighting. Fox then

underwent a rigorous feedback process with her internship hosts.

As an intern with a beekeeper, Katy Morin witnessed a queen bee hatch in her hands during a tour of hives throughout the state, which included a stop at the governor's mansion.

Richard Jiang learned the ins and outs of hotel management at Stone Ridge Lodge where he was immersed in tasks ranging from reception to landscaping to online billing.

At I.D. Web Digital, Mason Laskey refined his website design skills. He learned how to create review pages, built marketing process checklists, create website user reports, and troubleshoot technical issues. By day five, Laskey said he "really started to get the hang of being able to navigate websites and know what he is doing when it comes to making little changes and

Progress, Not Partisanship

I am a registered Democrat. However, I have previously registered as an independent and a Republican to vote in the primary for the candidate who was the best person for the job. My work in the Legislature this session has been equally pragmatic.

At the beginning of the legislative session, I introduced LD 148 to create ongoing absentee voting in Maine. My work on this issue began in 2019 when a similar bill, introduced by former Senator Linda Sanborn, ultimately stalled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Later in the session, I transferred sponsorship of LD 148 to Speaker Ryan Fecteau, D-Biddeford, who has been a long-time champion for this election modernization.

Following a widely attended public hearing, the bill received bipartisan support in the House of Representatives. While this bill did not address every need, we made it easier for senior citizens and disabled Mainers to vote from home on an ongoing basis without the need to request multiple ballots. This measure will go into effect in time for the 2024 elections.

Having been an advocate of open primaries since 2017, I was proud to co-sponsor legislation to allow unenrolled voters to participate in primaries. LD 231, introduced by Sen. Chloe Maxmin, D- Nobleboro, passed by wide bipartisan majorities in both the House and the Senate.

For me, this issue is about basic fairness. Primaries are taxpayer fund-

ed elections in which over half of legislative races are effectively decided. Large portions of the electorate, particularly young people and veterans, should not be denied the right to participate in these first-round elections.

Among the other pieces of legislation that I worked on this session, I am proud to report that the following bills were passed by the Legislature with bipartisan support:

LD 857, a bill to create a municipal grant program to support sustainable economic development projects, was passed with unanimous support in both chambers and is now law. The bill is sitting on the Appropriations table awaiting funding using the federal COVID-19 relief dollars.

LD 1073, a bill to study changes that might be made to legislative structures and processes to improve the operations of the Legislature and, in turn, generate better outcomes for the Maine people, was passed with unanimous bipartisan support in both chambers and is sitting on the Appropriations table awaiting funding.

LD 1364, a bill to study whether it would be feasible and desirable for the state to provide incentives for developers, builders and home buyers to install residential fire sprinklers, was passed with unanimous bipartisan support in both chambers and is now law.

LD 1497, a bill to strengthen the RealizeMaine program at Maine Development Foundation and create a youth task force to inform statelevel workforce and economic development planning conversations, was passed with unanimous bipartisan support in both chambers and is awaiting funding.

In addition to these successes, LD 446, my bill to research and recommend solutions for supporting regional and local planning, was passed by Democratic majorities in both chambers.

In addition to these successes and good work to combat the pandemic, there have also been setbacks with vetoes from the governor on issues ranging from criminal justice reform to tribal sovereignty. The governor's veto of LD 1708 will deny Maine voters the opportunity to weigh in on the merits of a public power utility for Maine. I urge supporters of Pine Tree Power to gather the signatures necessary to place this question on the November 2022 ballot so voters can have their say on this important issue.

I welcome the opportunity to hear from you on these and other issues that matter to you. Please contact me with any concerns or questions.



Be on the Lookout for Beech Leaf Disease

Maine Forest Service

Beech leaf disease has been found in Maine's forests and has been added to the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Foresty's invasive species list. Symptoms of the disease were found in Lincolnville, Belfast, Rockport, Searsmont, and Hope.

The Maine Forest Service (MFS) is asking for the public's help in identifying additional areas impacted by beech leaf disease. If you suspect you have found affected leaves,

please submit photos using the MFS online tree ailment form, email foresthealty@maine.gov, or call (207)

Photos should include a clear shot view of the underside of an affected leaf or leaves. Please report concerns even if photos can not be provided.

Symptoms include: dark bands between the veins of leaves curled, deformed, or shriveled leaves, tree develops a thin canopy of leaves.

Chlorine Tablet Shortage

Swimming pool owners may be in for a shock this summer. Trichlor (chlorine) tablets, necessary to sanitize backyard pools, are going to be harder to get. Prices have skyrocketed, as well.

The scarcity is the result of a perfect storm of events. Homeowners installed more backyard pools in response to being stuck at home during Covid-19. In fact, there was almost a 23% increase over the previous year, and pool installations are expected to rise again in 2021.

Secondly, the Bio-Lab fire at the plant in Louisiana last year has left a big hole in the supply chain. About

70% of the tablets used in the U.S. were manufactured there. Two other manufacturers make chlorine tablets, but according to experts, they would both need to increase their production by about 50% in order to fill the gap, and that will most likely not happen in time.

Pool owners are being asked to buy only what they need for this season. Panic buying will only make matters worse by driving up prices even higher. Larger, public pools generally use a different form of chlorine for sanitizing, and should be quite safe for swimmers.

News from Presumpscot **Regional Land Trust**

The Presumpscot Regional Land Trust (PRLT) is pleased to announce that Steep Falls Preserve is now a reality, thanks to the generous gift of land from the Anderson Family and the donations from 70 individuals and families in the region. Twenty acres adjacent to the 300 acre Steep Fall Wildlife area and the Mountain Division Trail are now protected forever.

The Land Trust has about \$30,000 left to raise and during July, **Gorham Savings Bank has generously** agreed to match donations up to \$500 until the \$10,000 challenge amount has been reached.

Staff and volunteers will begin wildlife enhancement projects this summer, including a trailhead and a familyfriendly loop trail. The official ribbon cutting opening ceremony will be scheduled for the fall.





Andrew Farr Comes Back Strong After Injury; **Enjoyed Record Breaking Spring Season**

Andrew Farr recently finished his junior year at GHS. He has been running competitively for about eight years, beginning in 2014 through the Gorham Youth Summer Track program.

His coach, Jason Tanguay said, "If you follow Gorham Track and Field, then you most likely know the name 'Andrew Farr.' In fact, many of us have followed Andrew's success on the track since he was in middle school," he said.

What some may not have realized, he had yet to compete in an outdoor track and field meet until this season; his 2019 season was hampered by an injury and the 2020 season shut down by COVID-

Farr has had much success in his track career; in the Spring of 2019, "I had qualified to compete in the 400m and 60m sprints at the Indoor New Balance Nationals. After a successful regular season, breaking the freshman 55m and 300m state records and being named 'Most Valuable Male Junior Division Athlete' in Maine, I was excited to see how I continued to progress throughout the postseason," he shared. Farr was making a name for himself doing something that he loved, sprinting.

During a practice in the week leading up to Nationals, Farr said he noticed his hamstrings felt a little tight. This is nothing unusual for a sprinter so he stretched and rolled a little more than usual until he was able to convince himself that they felt "good enough." However, about halfway through the first repetition, he said his left hamstring pain went from tolerable to excruciating.

"At the time, I didn't know the difference between tightness and injury, so I tried to push through; my heart said, 'go faster,' but my decelerating legs suggested otherwise. I ended a lot more than just that workout as soon as I crossed the line," he remembered.

"After that practice, I remember my coach telling me "you could lose a lot more than you could gain in these next couple of days if you aren't careful," and those words lay ingrained in my mind," Farr said. "If I had gone into practice with that mentality, I might have been saved from pulling my hamstring and placing last at Nationals later that week," he added.

What happened, Farr went on to explain, was a gruelling eleven months of physical therapy, grief and depression that followed his injury.

When Farr pulled his hamstring again, it was at a meet in Gorham. "I can vividly remember athletes from other towns immediately embracing and comforting me, specifically Thornton Academy sprinters Isaac Ofielu and Joshua Sewell, as well as many others," he shared.

Farr is not shy when talking about his difficulties with his injuries and his recovery. "Three months of painstaking doubt, of uncertainty, of going through the daily motions, of doing everything in my power to heal as quickly as I could. However, for the longest time, it felt as if I were working in complete darkness, reaching for a goal that I didn't know would ever be reached: full recovery," he shared.

Fast forward to the 2021 season;

after three regular season meets. Farr broke the 100m (11.02), 200m (22.42), and 400m (49.41) Gorham High School boys outdoor track and field records and entered the state meet ranked number one in the state in all three events.

At the state meet, he won the 400m and was runner-up in the 100m and

200m. Farr also ran the 400m leg on the distance medley relay team that broke the school record (along with Reed Henderson, Josh Lehmann, and Calvin Cummings).

"There was no New England meet this year, but I still wanted to push



Spring Sports Wraps Up 2021 Season

BASEBALL: Assistant Coach Dan Morin

The Rams started the season winning 17-0 vs. Westbrook going 3-0 before losing at Scarborough. The boys went on to win 4 of their next 6 games and were 7-3, but unfortunately hit some end of season speed bumps to finish 7-7.

The highlight of 2021 came when hosting Noble to start the playoffs. Junior Kyle Skolfield pitched a nohitter leading Gorham to a 1-0 win. Coach Morin said heartbreak ended the season after a controversial, but hardfought 3-2 loss vs top-ranked Thornton Academy.

"Southern Maine had arguably the most talented crop of high school pitchers in memory. Included in that group were Rams juniors Colin McDonald (1st Team All-Conference) and Kyle Skolfield (2nd Team All-Conference)," Morin shared.

McDonald started 7 games and was 3-0, while striking out 53 batters in 40 innings pitched. He finished with a 1.75 ERA.

Skolfield started 5 games on the mound but had a hard luck 2-win, 2-loss record despite giving up only 13 hits and 8 total runs (4 earned/.894 ERA) in over 31 innings and striking out 43 hitters.

Joining McDonald and Skolfield as all conference, were 1st Team All-Conference Rams, junior outfielder Caleb Hendrix, and sophomore second-baseman Quinn Dillon. Left fielder Cody Sellick (junior), was named Honorable Mention All-Conference.

"Gorham looks to even bigger and better things for 2022 as they lose one starter to graduation (Bode Meader). The Rams coaching staff wishes only the best to Bode, and other 2021 graduates, Nick Wiliams and Ian Obrey, for their commitment and competitiveness on the diamond," Morin said.

GIRLS OUTDOOR TRACK & FIELD: Coach John Caterina

Coach John Caterina said the Gorham Girls had an outstanding season. The girls team had 35 members with 12 seniors. They finished the regular season undefeated at 7-0 and scored first in a "virtual" version of the SMAA championship meet.

The girls topped off their tremendous season with a strong 2nd place finish (out of 23 teams) in the Class A State Championship meet on June 5th. Juniors Emma Green and Alyvia Caruso won individual state championships in the high jump and 100 m Hurdles respectively. The 4 X 100 Relay Team of Maddie Michaud, Nevaeh Moore, Emma Green and Sydney Connolly defended their 2019 first place finish with a new school record time.

Other scorers included Sydney Connolly in the 100 and 200; Alyvia Caruso in the 300 Hurdles and Long Jump; Olivia Michaud in the Javelin; Carolyn Bishop in the 1600 Racewalk; Elisabeth Loranger in the 400 and the 4 X 800 Relay team of Elisabeth Loranger, Sydney Fox, Rita Cummings and Rachel Cummings.

BOYS OUTDOOR TRACK & FIELD: Coach Jason Tanguay

The boys team had 30 members with 10 seniors. They finished the regular season with a record of 4 wins and 3 losses.

They entered the postseason hungry and had a 5th place finish (out of 23 teams) in the Class A State Championship meet. Individual state champions were senior Ryan Gendron, in the high jump; junior Andrew Farr, in the 400, breaking the school record again, along with other school records that day in the 100 and 200; and sophomore, Lucien Beardsley, in the racewalk.

Other scorers included Andrew Farr in the 100 and 200; Ryan Gendron in the long jump; 4x400 relay team of Tommy Sallinen, Elijah Wyatt, Josh Lehmann and Andrew Farr.

BOYS TENNIS: Coach Aaron Landry

Boys Tennis entered the playoffs as the 12 seed - by far the best 12 seed ever in class A tennis according to Coach Aaron Landry.

"We gained a lot of experience at singles, and though the record was tough, sophomore Patrick Cyr, junior Will Boylen, and sophomore Kevin Luo have a bright future in the next few years," Landry said.

GHS Senior Internship Experience is a Success

Kylie Mathieson investigated her interest in speech pathology by observing therapy sessions, evaluations, and assisting with curriculum development at The Maine Chatterbox. Mathieson marveled at how the "therapist was able to do it almost entirely through play" and at "the difference in speech between the older kids and the younger kids."

As an aspiring aeronautical engineer, Tess Libby took her internship in a different direction, using it as an opportunity to conduct an extraterrestrial soil experiment by attempting to grow plants in Mars-like soil. Libby said that she hopes to "expand her understanding of how humans might be able to terraform a planet's atmosphere using a simulation of the planet's soil medium."

In partnership with Maine Foodscapes, MacKenna Homa developed a survey intended to gain insights to create a sustainable composting program for local farmers, homeowners, and renters. Homa plans to pursue environmental engineering in college so she can "create sustainable solutions for our future."

"The internship program is designed to be the culmination of participating seniors' academic experiences at Gorham High School, highlighting the skills of self-direction they have learned," said Brian Jandreau, GHS principal.

"It is a genuine opportunity for seniors to merge their various interests and passions with their academic lives at school. Similarly, it is a vehicle for seniors to demonstrate independence and complexity of thought as they build bridges from their high school careers to their future academic, professional, or vocational lives."

While bleach can be used as an alternative, it is about half the strength of chlorine. Pool owners are urged to avoid using "splashless" bleach as it contains very little chlorine and also contains several dangerous additives.

The 400m record stands out because Farr had never really thought of himself as a 400 runner before this season, saying it's by far the toughest race he's run. Two years ago, Farr found it hard to imagine he would be fully recovered, let alone breaking records and ranked first in the state.

Coach Tanguay has nothing but pride when speaking of Andrew. "He has persevered through all of these obstacles and found himself to be in a place where he better understands his body and also better appreciates and embraces the process needed to be successful," Tanguay said.

"Special thanks to all our parents, athletics and grounds staff, and the officials for the hard work everyone put in to be ready for the season, and the flexibility necessary to make it all happen," Coach Jones said.


