January 11 Election to Fill Legislative Vacancy

A special election will be held January 11, 2022, to fill the District 27 legislative seat vacated by Kyle Bailey.

District 27 includes Wards 1-1 and 1-2 in Gorham and parts of Scarborough. Ward 1 voters will vote at the Gorham Middle School; Ward 1-2 will vote at Great Falls Elementary School.

Voters can request absentee ballots on-line or by calling the Town Clerk's office. Ballots will be mailed mid-December.

Candidates running for the position are Jim Boyle (D), Suzanne Phillips (unenrolled), and Tim Thorson (R). Phillips is currently on the Town Council but, if elected, could serve in both positions.

The winning candidate will fill the District 27 term that expires at the end of 2022.

Don't Miss Out on Health Care Coverage

There's a lot going on in each of our lives these days with the holiday season here. Between balancing time with friends and family, volunteering or buying gifts for loved ones, it can be a fun but also hectic time. Beyond the holidays and all our commitments, however, there's another thing you should remember before the year ends: Open Enrollment.

You've probably heard this before, but as a refresher, Open Enrollment is the set period of time each year when folks who don't get their health insurance through work can shop for new coverage plans through the Affordable Care Act (ACA) Marketplace. Lasting from Nov. 1 to Jan. 15, these few weeks are a critically important time, since you won't be able to purchase an insurance plan on the marketplace at another point of the year unless you qualify for a special enrollment period.

Though Open Enrollment isn't new to us here in Maine, there are some positive changes that you should be aware of. This year, instead of utilizing the federal marketplace as we have done in previous years, we now have our own Maine-based insurance exchange called CoverME.gov!

In 2019, the Legislature passed a law that set the process in motion for Maine to establish its own marketplace, and now, it's up, running and saving Mainers money. CoverMe.gov is

designed specifically for folks right here in Maine, not for the whole country. I'm thankful that we now have our own marketplace that's built to address the unique needs Mainers face.

Health insurance is now more affordable than ever through the marketplace. Thanks to increased federal aid, roughly 80 percent of Mainers will be able to qualify for some sort of financial assistance. Even if you haven't qualified for subsidies in the past, it's time to look once again.

I know that for some, finding coverage through the marketplace can seem like a daunting task. Thankfully, there are people here to help. Maine Consumers for Affordable Health Care is an organization whose sole mission is to help Mainers find – and understand – health coverage. They operate a free consumer assistance helpline from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and you can call them at 1-800-965-7476.

This past year, I sponsored a bill to provide continued funding for this important service. The bill was signed into law by the governor, and will ensure that Mainers can continue to access unbiased, professional advice when it comes to their health coverage.

In the Legislature, I am fortunate to serve on the Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services Committee, where we work to expand access to health care and ensure that all Mainers can afford the medications that they need. During the previous legislative session, we passed new laws to increase transparency in prescription drug pricing; to establish the Office of Affordable Health Care, which will help our state identify causes and solutions to out of control costs; and created a new lifesaving emergency insulin program, which will help prevent a worst-case scenario of someone dying because they couldn't afford their insulin that month.

I'm proud of what we've accomplished, but I know there's more to be done. Whether you get your insurance through the marketplace or through your job, my colleagues and I are working each and every day to ensure that no matter your income or where you live, that you can access quality, affordable care. Everyone deserves that ability.



Winter Season Safety

Our holiday wish is for all residents to have a merry, bright, and SAFE holiday season. We encourage you to follow maintenance and decorating tips to prevent fires this season:

•IF you prefer natural to artificial, choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched and be sure to add water to the tree stand daily.

- •MAKE sure any tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights and make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- •USE only lights that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory such as UL. Read the manufacturer's instructions for the number of light strands to connect and use; some lights are only for indoor OR outdoor use — not both.

•CHECK all lights, and replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections.

 ALWAYS turn off decoration lights before leaving home or going to bed.

• NEVER leave lit candles unattended.

•DISPOSE of natural trees after Christmas or when it is dry. Driedout trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage or placed outside against the home.

Lastly, smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors make great gifts that can save lives.

If you have a fire, call 911. Even if you think it is out, a smoldering fire can re-ignite.

By following these fire prevention tips, we can greatly reduce the risk of fire in your home and enjoy a safe holiday season making our holiday wish come true.

Sleep Habits and Alzheimer's

As more has been learned about

why we sleep and what happens

during sleep, it has become

increasingly clear that sleep is

Paying attention to your sleep habits can reduce the risk of in the range of 40% of dementia Alzheimer's. It has long been a point of pride for some people to claim that they function well on very little sleep. Getting a full night's sleep has sometimes even been characterized as wasting valuable time that could be better used in productive activities.

As more has been learned about why we sleep and what happens during sleep, it has become increasingly clear that sleep is not a waste of by addressing these and other

time; that it is, in fact, one of the most productive activities we can engage in.

Sufficient, quality sleep is the body's way of restoring its vital organs, especially the brain. Our brains are actually more active during parts of our natural sleep

just not conscious of that activity.

What happens when one does not get sufficient sleep over a period of time? Research shows that the lack of consistent sleep can impact our brains in negative ways; ways that increase our risk for Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia.

A research review in the scientific journal Nature Communications recently concluded that persistent short sleep durations of six hours or less at age 50, 60 and 70, as compared to a normal night's sleep of seven to eight hours, was associated with a 30% increase in dementia risk. The study looked at research that followed participants for 10 years or more.

So, what happens in our brains while we sleep? According to Jeremy Pruzin, MD, a memory care expert at Banner Alzheimer's Institute in Phoenix, "Sleep is a restorative function. While we sleep the brain repairs synapses, solidifies new learning and memories, and clears substances, including the betaamyloid protein associated with Alzheimer's disease."

"Science shows that somewhere cases worldwide could be delayed or even prevented with long-term lifestyle changes," says Dr. Pruzin. These include increased physical activity, smoking cessation, staying socially engaged, getting enough consistent, quality sleep, and eating a healthy diet. "You can give yourself the best chance at avoiding cognitive decline and dementia

> lifestyle factors decades. over Doing so can outweigh factors we have no control over, like the genes we inherit from our parents."

Pruzin Dr. shared the following suggestions for getting a good night's sleep:

cycle than when we're awake. We're view bed as a place of rest and use it only for sleep; don't watch television, and don't use your cell phone or computer in bed; go to sleep and wake up at about the same time every day, weekends included; limit caffeine and alcohol; be sure you engage in at least some physical activity during the day.

> Getting enough quality sleep, especially when combined with other healthy habits like engaging in regular daily exercise, eating a healthy diet (check out the MIND diet), managing stress, socializing often with friends and family, and exercising your brain by learning new things, makes it possible to significantly lower your risk for developing Alzheimer's. There is no drug that even comes close.



A Lover of Loons...A Loon Champion

Loon Facts:

Loons can live up to 35 years

Loons typically don't start breeding until they reach 6 or 7 years of age.

The largest, or heaviest, loons in the world live in Maine, and they can be almost double the size of a loon from Manitoba or Saskatchewan.

They do not mate for life. The average pair bond lasts about 7 years, although one pair stayed bonded for 17 years.


Minnesota has the most loon pairs in the lower 48, followed by Maine, and then Wisconsin.

A few loons have choked trying to swallow a fish too large for them to swallow.

Their closest bird relatives are penguins.

They can dive up to 200 feet (or more).

Pair members winter in different locations, with the female often wintering further south than their mates.





Dr. James D. Pauruk proudly displays his new, definitive book about loons, based on over 30 years of research. Holding a loon is an other worldly experience and is done by professionals, only to band them or if they are suspected of having health issues.

Nothing is more captivating than the haunting call of a loon echoing on one of Maine's many lakes. Very few people know as much about loons and what their calls actually mean than Gorham Resident, Dr. James D. Paruk. Jim is a scientist, author, educator and a worldrenowned loon expert who has been studying them for nearly 30 years in many locations in Canada and the U.S., including Maine.

Jim's definitive new book, called "Loon Lessons: Uncommon **Encounters With the Great Northern** Diver", was published this June by the University of Minnesota Press and is receiving great reviews. Jim shares his knowledge, gained through more than 5000 hours of field research, about the mysterious and well-loved water bird. His is the first scientific book published about loons since the late 1980s, but that doesn't mean it's just for science geeks.

His writing style is personal, lively and accessible for all lovers of loons. According to Barnes and Noble, the book describes the loon's

biology "in an entertaining style that affords a deeper understanding of this beautiful and mysterious bird's natural history and annual life cycle". The book is available at the Bookworm in Gorham and at many other bookstores and online vendors.

Jim's impressive credentials include a long list of scholarly articles. He is in demand as a speaker with organizations across the country, as well as conferences in Iceland and Finland. In Maine, he has spoken at local Audubon chapters and several libraries, was interviewed by Maine Public radio and has appeared on the local TV show, 207. He has also led ornithology courses throughout North and Central America.

Jim will be giving a talk and book signing at Baxter Memorial Library on Tuesday, December 14 at 6:30 p.m. Check with Baxter for more details.

So, how did a city kid who grew up in Hamtramck, which is completely surrounded by Detroit, become a loon expert?



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

SKI TEAM: COACH STEVE MUNKACSI


Key athletes to watch this season are Ryker Spear, Trent Stevens, Sam Munkacsi, and Owen Ballard.

London's :Call of the Wild", as well as books about the natural world, and the fire was lit.

When asked for advice for young people thinking about pursuing a career in science, Jim said, "Follow your passion and interests. Science and compassion are going to help us solve the world's problems."

Jim earned a PhD at Idaho State University, a Master's at Northern Illinois University, and bachelor's degree in Science at Lake Superior State University.

After finishing his Master's program, Jim received a life-changing call from an undergraduate college friend, Dave Evers, inviting him to ioin a field research study where Iim learned how to catch and band a loon. This invitation turned out to be momentous, spurring Jim to pursue his PhD focusing on loon behavior.

When you ask Jim what it's like to hold a loon, a look of reverence crosses his face. He says, "Loons personify wilderness and wildness. In a way, it doesn't feel respectful to hold one of these birds in your arms."

Eventually, loons also brought Jim and his family to Maine. Jim was happily raising a family and teaching at Northland College on the shores of Lake Superior when his college friend, Dave, called again. This time, he had a job offer asking Jim to be the director of a project to study the effects of the 2010 Deepwater Horizon spill on loons and other water birds in the Gulf of Mexico. This would involve a move to Maine and coming to work at Biodiversity

Institute (BRI), Dave's company, located in Gorham.

Jim said, "It was a really tough decision as we were settled in Wisconsin (and Green Bay Packers fans), but it turned out for the best. Gorham has excellent schools, we've made good friends here and we love the small town activities and atmosphere."

BRI has since relocated to Portland, but Jim continues to be involved, holding a senior research position and serving as Vice Chair of its Board of Directors.


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
