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A New Step for Gorham Graduates

We've all heard about the graduations throughout the pandemic, the amazing resilience the Class has had and the years taken away from them, but now we enter a new segment. The graduations out of the pandemic.

Although this still remains a pandemic year with covid cases continuing and masks being required up until the end of February, this is also the first time in three years that Gorham High School gave students the option to graduate at the Merrill just as the Class of 2019 and past did. The duo was able to successfully lead the rows and create order within the loosely formatted ceremony.

After the 215 students walked the length of the track, they stayed standing for the Presentation of Colors presented by the Gorham Police Department and the National Anthem sung by Gorham Senior Chamber

Voting Results

Gorham voters turned out in small numbers on July 14 to pass a \$46.4 million school budget by a nearly two to one vote. The Town Council had reduced the \$46 million budget submitted by the School Committee by primary election. \$1.6 million. The combined municipal and school budget totals \$66.2 million and will result in an estimated mil rate increase of \$0.49. Voters chose overwhelming to continue voting annually on the school budget referendum. Candidates of both the Republican and Democratic political parties were unopposed with the exception of Cumberland County District Attorney. Democratic voters in Gorham chose Jacqueline Sartoris over incumbent Johnathan Sahrbeck. By law unenrolled voters were not permitted to

vote for primary candidates. However, the state legislature has passed a law taking effect in 2024 that will allow unenrolled voters to participate in either a Democratic or Republican

Like the total number of registered Maine voters, about one-third of Gorham voters are unenrolled in a political party.

The four referendum questions that authorized the Town Council to spend funds already budgeted for infrastructure projects also passed overwhelmingly. Voters are required by law to approve expenditures over \$250,000 even when this requires no additional new funds. Jane Sexton, who ran unopposed, was elected a Portland Water District Trustee.

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

Bike and Bow Biathlon at Cherry Hill Farm

In late May, Gorham Outdoors hosted their annual Bike and Bow Biathlon at Cherry Hill Farm in Gorham. This was the club's second time hosting the event, with 32 participants.

The event includes a 1-mile bike ride on the Shaw Cherry Hill Farm trails followed by four attempts with arrows at an archery target. This was repeated four times for a total of four miles and four opportunities to hit the archery target. The two-person team event consisted of each team member riding their bikes the one-mile ride twice followed by the archery shoot.

The Biathlon is a fund-raising event with all proceeds going towards helping the club sponsor other outdoor activities. Sponsors included Sebago Brewing Company, Gorham Parks and Recreation Department and Greater Portland chapter of the New England Mountain Bike Association (GPNEMBA).

Volunteers for this event included track coaches Tim Spear of Gorham Middle School and Jason Tanguay of Gorham High School and Jim Karcanes, grounds and facilities manager at Gorham Rec., who wants all biking enthusiasts to know that Gorham has four mountain biking trails: Backwoods Bypass (the sandpit) located off Gaia Lane; Shaw Cherry Hill Farm; Claire Drew Trail Park and Alden Hill.



LETTUCE BE HEALTHY

Cabbage Casserole

2 pound lean ground beef 1 large onion, diced 4 cloves garlic, crushed or minced 1 jar tomato/basil sauce

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste

2 tablespoon olive oil, divided 4 tablespoons water, divided 1 large head cabbage, chopped into 1-inch squares 2 cups asiago cheese shredded 2 eggs 3⁄4 cup milk

1 (28-ounce) can diced tomatoes, undrained

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. In a large skillet on the stove-top over medium heat, add the beef and onion and Sauté until the beef is browned and no pink remains, for about 5-6 minutes.

Add the garlic and cook until fragrant, about 1 minute. Stir in the tomato sauce, salt, pepper, paprika, thyme, tomato paste, and diced tomatoes (including the juices) and simmer until thickened, about 10 minutes. Remove the skillet from the heat.

In a separate skillet, heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil. Once the oil is shimmering, add 2 tablespoons of water and 1/2 of the cabbage and sauté until just softened, about 5 minutes. Transfer the cooked cabbage to a plate and repeat the sautéing process with the remaining olive oil, water, and cabbage.

In a 9x13-inch casserole dish, layer 1/2 of the cabbage then 1/2 of the meat sauce on top of the cabbage in the casserole dish. Repeat the layers. Cover the casserole with foil and bake for 45 minutes.

In a small bowl, mix together the asiago cheese, eggs and milk. Remove the foil and top the casserole with the cheese mixture. Bake the casserole uncovered for 25-30 minutes til golden on top. Serve over rice. Enjoy on a cool summer evening.

Check Out Rare Sky Event

Five of our planets will align during the month of June, but the best viewing will be on June 23 and 24, with Mercury being the last to appear, lowest on the horizon around the 27th.

You will have to get up early to catch the view, with your naked eye, of five planets plus the Moon. Lined up in order: from left to right you will be able to see, in an ascending arc, faint Mercury (after the 27th), then dazzling Venus, the crescent moon, then reddish Mars, bright Jupiter and creamy Saturn. You will need a clear view of the north east to south eastern horizon, about 45 minutes before sunrise. Set your alarm and bring binoculars for a better view of our planets, seen all together, a rarity that last occurred in 2004.

Town Council Report

Chairman Pratt opened the June 7, 2022 meeting. There were 48 members of the public and 5 councilors in attendance.

Public Communications:

Residents Christopher Jacques, Rich Abato, and Allison Jamieson voiced their opinions on the proposed zoning change in the area from South Street to Brackett Road from Rural and Suburban Residential District to the Urban Expansion District, citing environmental concerns.

Deanna Marsh suggested that the Town hire a sustainability coordinator. She asked that the 2016 development plan be amended earlier than the set date of 2026, and asserted that the growth Gorham has experienced should be reflected by a forwardlooking hire.

Jeff Joyce remarked on the recent loss of Public Safety employees to other towns and asked the town manager and Council members to address the situation before it gets out of hand.

Councilor Communications:

Councilor Kuech acknowledged that June is National Pride Month, and assured people living and looking to live in Gorham that they can expect friendly and welcoming spaces here in Gorham. She attended the annual meeting of GPCOG on May 26 where they voted on officers, the executive committee and the budget. The National Coordinator recognized Baxter Memorial Library as a Family Place Library.

Councilor Wilder Cross attended the 10 year anniversary of Great Falls Elementary School and congratulated everyone involved. She thanked Cindy Hazelton and everyone involved in organizing a very thoughtful Memorial Day parade and service.

Councilor Phillips thanked the members of the public who spoke during open public communications. She congratulated the Gorham Conservation Commission and its volunteers for creating the new Knolly Roller Trail along with all of the other things they have planned in that area. The beginner-friendly flow trail for mountain bikers is located between the high school and middle school campuses. Councilor Phillips reported that the annual Gorham Taste Walk drew over 400 people. She has been working with the Historical Preservation commission and Town Planner Carol Eyerman to create an online historical map.

Councilor Hartwell noted that there is a temporary sign law in effect when placing signs in the right-of-way on state and state aid highways. The law allows temporary signs to be placed in the right-of-way for up to 6 weeks

and further states that individual signs bearing substantially the same message must be placed at least 30 feet from one another and requires that each sign be labeled with the owner's name, address and the date on which the sign was erected.

Chairman Pratt explained that the current jetport runway closure should be completed by June 14, reducing extra jet noise over Gorham. He reminded people of the blood shortage and asked everyone to please donate blood if you can. He also thanked everyone involved for the remarkable Memorial Day celebration.

Town Manager Paraschak reminded citizens that the Vision Appraisal by Cumberland County Assessing is still going on throughout the town. They should be wrapping up their work by the summer. He also pointed out the the School Budget/referendum election will be held on June 14 and also the Appointments Committee is looking for citizen volunteers to fill a seat on the Planning Board.

Proposed Orders:

On the issue of the proposed school budget, Councilor Phillips began the conversation by suggesting that she would accept nothing more than about half of the 8.4% increase proposed. Councilor Kuech offered an impassioned defense of the proposed budget. She argued that cutting the budget would limit the district's ability to employ ed techs and force them to inflate class sizes. Chairman Pratt offered that he understood both sides of this difficult decision, but that he couldn't condone an 8.4% budget increase at a time when the risk of economic downturn is high.

A proposed amendment to the Land Use and Development Code to allow Office of Contractor or Tradesman as a permitted use to the following sections: 1-12 Industrial District, 1-13 Mosher Corner Mixed Use District, 1-14 Office Residential District, 1-21 Olde Canal Industrial District and 1-22 Agricultural Industrial District was discussed and referred to the Town Council with a recommendation to adopt. Nouria Energy Corporation's request for approval to redevelop an existing convenience store which would consist of a 6,000 sq. ft. convenience store and Amato's Restaurant with drive through, 8 gas pumps and 2 diesel pumps located at 435 Ossipee Trail was discussed. One waiver was granted, the other was discussed and postponed.

Leaf Labs, LLC request for approval of a 40,900 sq. ft. warehouse and grow facility with associated parking at 65 Olde Canal Way was discussed and moved to be placed on a future consent agenda.

Lyndsay Hastings' request for approval to split off a lot at 73 Brackett Road was discussed. Two waivers were approved and the matter was postponed.

Ricky Jones, 36 Middle Jam Road's request for a four-lot residential subdivision was discussed.

Barbara and Joel Slager's request for approval of a 2-6 lot private way approximately 150 feet long on North Street was discussed.



Singers. After being seated by Cutter and Castonguay the crowd was greeted by Jandreau's Opening Remarks.

Jandreau touched on losing time with the Class of '22 and how they remarkably logged 9,729 volunteer hours, approximately 44 hours per student, one of the highest volunteer hours recorded in Gorham. Jandreau continued with "The Starfish Story" by Loren Eisley. The story depicts the idea of how each individual can contribute to a greater cause and how one small act can have a ripple effect.

Jandreau concluded his speech with "You are an amazing group of people. Pursue your dreams and do what you can to make the world a better place for future generations". He then introduced Class President and Salutatorian, Kate Dupuis.

Dupuis started her speech by acknowledging she knew she would be delivering a speech on graduation day as class president and since sophomore year has tried to rack her brain with a topic. "I've searched for a message that's inspiring, impactful and hopefully, even memorable, but here I am today and I still feel like I don't have those words for you. So instead, to get my message across, I thought I'd tell you a story of two kids."

The officers then initiated the turning of the tassel from right to left, followed by the first class song performed outside, "I'm On Top of the World" by Imagine Dragons.

After the last "I'm on Top of the World" was sung, Jandreau officially announced the Class of 2022 graduates and the array of caps were thrown. Ellie Perry encapsulated the feelings of many graduates by saying "I'm so glad I can spend this day with my favorite people surrounding me. It's such a big moment in my life."


Amidst all the celebration among families and friends and their graduates, Elijah Wyatt summed up the day by saying "It feels like everything is wrapping up. It's bittersweet."



June School Committee Report

At the June 8 regular School Committee meeting, Superintendent Heather Perry spoke briefly about the controversy related to an email she sent when constituting a committee to review posters in the Gorham Middle School (GMS) health classroom. She apologized for "poor choice of words," but said that her intention was to address a complex and sensitive issue and to make clear that policies were followed. She believes that "slowing things down" allows time to examine issues and not make hasty decisions. Perry said that parents should have a role and that she will be looking into "increasing parental access to curriculum" as one of her goals for the coming year. The department has a Controversial Issues Policy that allows students to learn about current issues, but also includes the option for parents with sincere beliefs to have their children opt out.

Perry also announced that the Department of Education pandemic guideline will expire on June 30. She said that she will be applying for a grant to help with pre-kindergarten expansion plans. The district has received a

her role in the hearing because he was suspicious that she wanted to divert or stall procedures.

Under Policy KE, Schools had determined that Lane's personnel complaint should come before the SC. She told the Gorham Times that "it has been reported that a concern has been raised

about me personally. I believe the concern is meritless." but she asked Darryl Wright to facilitate the executive session "out of an abundance of caution." The procedure permits the person making the complaint ten minutes to speak. The person who is the subject of the com-

plaint may also speak for ten minutes. No action was taken at the hearing, and since this was a personnel matter it was not public. Two other complaints have been made to the SC chair; one will be brought to the committee and the other has yet to be determined by the chair.

Lane and several other parents have addressed the School Committee at public meetings with complaints about curriculum materials. Policy IJJ delegates responsibility for the selection of instructional and library materials to the professionally trained District personnel, subject to criteria and procedures. These are outlined in Policy IJJ-R and IJJ-RR, available on-line from the School Committee section of the Gorham School Department website.

Lane's complaint about posters that defined gender identity vocabulary was

reviewed following the procedure for a materials challenge. After following policy procedures the request for their removal was denied. Lane has requested an appeal to the School Committee whose decision will be final. He has filed one other request for removal of a book from the GHS library: "All Boys Aren't

Blue: A Memoir-Manifesto," а young adult memoir by a queer Black Perry, "Each case is being dealt boy that is also available at Baxter Memorial Library. own merit. The School Committee The book has at least one sexually explicit paragraph. Additionally, two other requests have been filed to remove a book from the GHS

> Andrew LaPlaca, a Gorham parent, has filed a complaint about a GHS library book, the graphic novel version of "The Handmaid's Tale" by Margaret Atwood, a futuristic dystopian novel which is also the basis of a television series. This complaint has been addressed by Sandra Rockett, GHS librarian, and GHS Principal Brian Jandreau and will follow the process for further evaluation.

\$250,000 grant to increase opportunities for experiential learning.

School Committee members thanked student representative Andrea Mitchell for her service on the committee. They expressed disappointment over the nearly \$1.6 million reduction the Town Council made to the school FY23 budget on June 7. Stewart McCallister believed that it is just "pushing costs down the road," agreeing with James Brockman that cuts "will have an impact on students that are struggling." Sarah Perkins and Darryl Wright both said that they need a better process than one giving the SC only two hours to determine where to cut \$1.6 million from the budget.

GHS Principal Brian Jandreau, GMS Principal Quinton Donahue, and Sandra Rockett, GHS librarian, gave a presentation on the criteria for 6-12 library selections. Jandreau said good books let students see reflections of themselves, gain empathy for the experiences of others, and develop their imagination and

creative problem-solving skills. Rockett explained her criteria for selection which includes positive reviews from professional journals, age appropriate materials on a wide range of topics, and concern for issues of diversity, equity and inclusion. She collaborates with teachers in the selection process.


Assistant Superintendent Brian Porter explained Every Student Success Act (ESSA) Title 1,2, and 4 grants that will provide \$332,077 in federal funding for the 2022-23 school year. Title 1 monies are used for basic supplemental instruction in math and reading for the lowest 25% of K-5 students. Title 2 funds are used for teacher and staff development, which includes summer learning opportunities. Title 4 funds are used for addressing social and emotional needs of students and to address issues of diversity, equity and inclusion.

The SC voted (7-0) to appoint Erin Epler Narragansett School principal. In other business, they approved hiring of six teachers, and three revised policies.

The vote to amend and adopt the school budget passed 5-1. It now reads: "Reduce the proposed school budget by 4.5% or \$1,755,135 and add back \$167,111 for anticipated new pupils bringing the total reduction to \$1,588,025.00 with the budget not to exceed \$46,427,320.00"

On the issue of the proposed municipal budget, several of the councilors commended the town manager's office for devising a creative, effective, and efficient municipal budget. The issue passed unanimously, with the councilors voting to adopt the 2022-2023 Fiscal Year Budget as presented.

A special amusement license was approved for Kristen Walker, Orchard Ridge Farm, all in favor.


