Plans for Little Falls School, Public Safety Building

At the August 6 Town Council meeting, the council began discussions of plans for both Little Falls School and the Public Safety Building following the June vote in which the plan to move Public Safety to Little Falls was turned down by voters almost three to one. In November 2012, voters did approve spending \$500,000 to make repairs and renovations to Little Falls School, which needs considerable work to keep the building properly maintained. It is anticipated that the building will need a new roof, new windows and a new heating system as well as bathroom upgrades to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Councilor Phinney suggested that the town needed to have a plan for the building before they went ahead with these improvements. Councilor Pressey saw a need to maintain a town asset and was hesitant to limit the upgrade to just those three items (roof, window and heat). If the usage of the building is changed, sprinklers must be installed to comply with the fire code at a cost estimated by Fire Chief Lefebvre to be \$30,000-40,000.

The Council adopted a Master Plan for the future development of the Little Falls Recreation Area. During Council discussion, Councilor Pressey felt the town should focus more on fixing or maintaining its existing fields rather than look to build new fields. Recreation Director Cindy Hazelton spoke about the need for more playing fields for the community, noting that the existing fields are being used at 100% capacity with a constant need for more space for sports. Because of the heavy use, the fields never get a chance to rest and therefore cannot be maintained properly. Hazelton believes the only way to allow some fields to rest and improve maintenance is to have more fields.

The Council also discussed putting together a proposal for the November ballot to spend \$5,000,000 to renovate and improve the current Public Safety Building. Town Manager David Cole noted that in 1999 the town evaluated their current and future needs and many of those needs have been met with a new middle school, a new Public Works Facility, the expansion of Baxter Memorial Library and a conversion of the old middle school to the Municipal Center. One need that has not yet been addressed is a new public safety building.

The Public Safety Building Committee, appointed by the Town Council, considered seven different options for both Little Falls and the Public Safety Building at 270 Main Street. The first choice was the option that voters rejected which would have moved Public Safety to Little Falls School. The second choice was to renovate the existing facility, which is the option now being reviewed.

Town Manager, David Cole said "Although the Committee felt the location in Little Falls was the best option, all of the Committee Members also felt that expanding the existing building at 270 Main Street was a good option." This option has an estimated cost of \$5.8 million and is expected to meet the needs of the community for the next 25 years. The proposed referendum has a maximum cost of \$5 million. Cole indicated that at \$5 million the project would likely have to be scaled back. Councilors Benner and Moulton expressed concerns that the original cost of \$5.8 million was more realistic as it is important to complete the project properly to better meet the town's needs. Councilor Phinney expressed concern that going to the voters in November was too soon. He added that \$5,000,000 might address current needs but would not address public safety needs for the next 20 years. Phinney felt the vote should be postponed until June to give the Council more time to review plans and determine the best possible option for the town and for Public Safety. Councilor Pressey recommended the work be done in phases and that the town should fix some of the biggest problems now.

Ultimately, the Council postponed a vote on the issue until their next meeting when they expect all seven councilors to be present.

Fostering Economic Development in Maine

Maine is a unique and beautiful state, known for its hard-working people. However, Maine is currently ranked third-worst in the nation for job creation and too many Mainers are unemployed or underemployed. That is why the Legislature worked tirelessly this session to foster economic development in our state.

The Maine Legislature established the Joint Select Committee on Maine's Workforce and Economic Future to address challenges faced by our workforce. The committee consists of a bipartisan group of lawmakers whose focus is developing Maine's workforce, strengthening downtowns and improving Maine's business climate.

Partnering with small businesses has been a central strategy of the committee. Small businesses make up 97.2 percent of employers in Maine and drive our economy; they are well positioned to identify what needs to be done to improve the economic outlook of our state.

Enhancing our workforce has been an area where Democrats and Republicans have come together. Everyone can agree that we need to make new skills and opportunities available to our workforce. We are determined to do something about it.

Maine needs an additional 15,000 highly skilled workers to remain competitive in the global economy, according to a recent report by a national nonprofit group, America's Edge. Between 2008 and 2018, Maine jobs requiring postsecondary education are expected to grow seven times faster than jobs for those without a high school diploma. By 2022, roughly 75 percent of the fastest-growing occupations with above-average wages will be jobs that require an associate degree or higher, according to the report.

The Maine Legislature established the Joint Select Committee on Maine's Workforce and Economic Future to address challenges faced by our workforce.

Through the committee's hard work, the Legislature passed comprehensive legislation that renews the partnership between government, education, workers and businesses and addresses the specific factors contributing to the skills gap. The legislation is funded through the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee's bipartisan two-year budget.

One part of the law will fully fund the Maine Apprenticeship Program (MAP). MAP helps mobilize Maine's workforce with structured, on-the-job learning in traditional industries such as construction and manufacturing, as well as emerging industries such as health care, information technology, energy and telecommunications.

The Legislature also enacted a historic, bipartisan omnibus energy

During the last fiscal year, the town saw an increase in commercial building permits from 38 the previous year to 44 last year. The low was 14 commercial permits issued in 2009-2010. The town also issued 79 permits for single-family homes (including condominium units) compared to a total of 48 issued the previous year and a low of 27 in 2008-2009.



There is a new store in town called Carter's Green Market located at 12 Main Street in Gorham. The store's

antique tin ceiling has a fresh coat of white paint, the walls have been primed and painted with a foodinspired melon hue, and new black linoleum covers the floor of this 750 sq. ft. store that formerly housed the Art Guru. Owner Holly Carter is hard at work stocking shelves with all natural and organic foods, vitamins, wines and beers in preparation for the grand opening on Saturday, August 17. Carter's intention is to bring a wide variety of locally and regionally grown organic food to the Gorham area that is not readily found at the local grocery store, while supporting local farmers and artisans as often as she can.

Findview Farm of Gorham will supply Carter's Green Market with fresh-frozen grass-fed beef, breakfast and sweet Italian sausages. Crown O'Maine is an organic cooperative that will supply the store with a wide selection of Maine-grown foods including fruits and vegetables, grains, dry beans, honey, maple syrup, organic meats and cheeses. Certified Organic Little River Flower Farm in Buxton will supply fruit, veggies and herbs, along with beautiful floral bouquets. Lastly, Maple's Organic Desserts in Yarmouth will provide the scrumptious sorbets and caramel peanut turtle gelatos (along with several other varieties) that Carter has had to re-order several times even before the grand opening!

Maureen Terry, chef and owner of Three Daughter's Cookie Co., (discerning gastronomes will remember Chef Mo from the Pinecrest Inn) will provide freshly baked bread, homemade



croutons, as well as her celebrated MoCrunch, a slow-roasted sweet and salty granola, which, she says, may be enjoyed as a snack, for breakfast or dessert. Carter has also solicited the expertise of Chef Mo in choosing the best wines from sustainable vineyards and has more than 150 bottles of artisan wine filling the back wall wine rack. "Our wine is not overly expensive," says Carter, "the usual price will range between \$10 and \$28 a bottle."

And if you subscribe to the slogan "Life is Short, Drink Good Beer" you'll find that good beer at Carters Green Market comes in many brands. "Most of our craft beers come from local and regional microbreweries," says Carter, naming Allagash, Rising Tide, Peak Organic and Storm King as a few. Gluten-free beer is also stocked.

A sizable amount of shelf space has been devoted to the Mega Food line of vitamins and supplements, as well as, popular skincare products by dermaE.

The idea of owning an organic specialty store in Gorham seldom entered Carter's thoughts, unless of course she found herself driving to Whole Foods in Portland on a busy workday afternoon and fighting traffic to come home and prepare dinner. "I'd often say to my husband how nice would it be to have an organic store in Gorham because driving to Portland to buy organic isn't always convenient," says Carter, "especially when you're employed full-time." Carter is hoping her store will fill a void in the Gorham community. She invites everyone to view Carter's Green Market on Facebook and stop in to take a look at the variety of products that her organic store has to offer. Maybe even a pint of Old Maine Blueberry Gelato to start with!

Avoiding Computer Malware and Viruses

Today, Internet use has become almost mandatory to function in society. People are being urged to perform many confidential tasks online including banking, paying bills, shopping, and applying for insurance, jobs, and credit cards to name a few. Unfortunately, Internet use comes with risks. Even though Internet users may have reputable anti-virus software installed on their computers, they may still be infected with malware, viruses, spyware, root kits, etc. while on the Internet. Users should know there is no anti-virus software in existence that can protect a computer from every current or future Internet threat.

Internet predators do not just target individuals. Just this year, cyber-attacks have been launched on a US-based power plant, Facebook, Twitter, Microsoft, Apple, the US Government, and many more prominent targets. One thing the Internet has done for better or worse is put everyone on a level playing field. Fifty years ago, only people in the "Big Cities" had to worry about crime in their communities. People in small communities, like Gorham, often did not even lock their doors at night. Today, anyone using the Internet, whether from a big city or small town, has to learn to "lock the door" to their computer.

There are several reasons Internet predators attack Internet users. They

may simply want to collect your personal information, e.g. name, address, age, and search history which they then sell to people who will use it to market you. Have you ever done a search for an item on the Internet, and then for the next several days seen

advertisements for that exact item on web pages you visit? That is NOT a coincidence.

Internet predators may want more personal information, such as Social Security number and credit card numbers. With this information, a hacker is armed with the tools to carry out identity theft. Other Internet predators may use "scareware" or "ransomware" attacks for monetary gain. The goal of the attack is to scare you into giving the Internet predator money to remove you from an "FBI Watch List", or to hold your computer ransom until they "remove viruses" from your computer, at a cost of course. Typically, the Internet predator makes the virus dormant for some period of time so they can extract more money from you at a later date.

The best thing an Internet user can do to avoid being infected with viruses and malware is to maintain reputable anti-virus software and to read carefully before clicking. Many Internet users have a tendency to quickly click through text boxes without reading them in order to arrive at the result they are seeking. This is where many Internet predators set their traps. Internet predators also use lures to entice Internet users to inadvertently download their malware or to infect them with viruses. If something on the Internet looks too good to be true, it probably is. Don't click on it. My mantra is "nothing on the internet is free. You've either already paid for it or you're going to pay for it." By that I mean you may receive what's being offered at no dollar cost, but you have probably paid for it by providing personal information or by inadvertently allowing the Internet predator to install malware or spyware on your computer. Always proceed with caution when using the Internet.





The Town Clerk's office hours are from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday; 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Thursday and 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Friday.

There is an opening on the Planning Board to fill an unexpired term. The Town Council Appointments Committee will be accepting applications until August 30, 2013. This term expires March 30, 2014.

Nomination papers will be available in the Town Clerk's office on August 12 for the upcoming November 5 Annual Municipal Election. There will be three Town Council terms and three School Committee terms for this election. Each of these terms is for three years. Candidates are required to collect at least 25 and no more than 100 valid registered voter signatures in order for their names to appear on the ballot. Nomination papers must be returned to the Town Clerk by September 23.

Last month we sent out 409 30-day property tax and sewer lien notices. Property taxes and sewer charges that remain unpaid on August 18 will have

liens filed in the Registry of Deeds. During this 30-day period we will not accept personal checks for payment of past due taxes or sewer fees.

The Clerk's office has also been diligently working with the Animal Control Officer to make sure that all dogs in Gorham are licensed. Currently there are 2,253 dogs registered in Gorham for the license year ending December 31.

Did you know you could purchase Town of Gorham Recycle bins, Gorham trash bags and large item tickets in the Clerk's office? Composting bins must be purchased at Public Works on Huston Road.

Time Warner Cable (TWC) Customers: Are you having trouble viewing Gorham's Community Access Television Channels 2 and 3?

By a federal government mandate all channels will eventually need to be transitioned to a digital format and the local channels were next in this conversion.

This change only affects people who subscribe to the basic level of programming. In other words, you plug the TWC cable directly into your television.

You have 2 options:

(1) Call the number posted 1-855-286-1736 or go on line to twc.com/digitaladapter, to order the adapter you need to view the channels.

Planning Board reviewed a site plan of a 12,600 square foot medical office building to house Martin's Point Health Center with associated parking and site improvements, located at the



Gorham Cyclists Reach the Heights in Italy

The Narragansett Wheelmen, a group consisting of cyclists from area towns including 15 regulars from Gorham, celebrated its 20th anniversary this year. The group did so in grand fashion with a week-long biking trip in May to The Dolomites, a mountain range in northeastern Italy and part of the Southern Limestone Alps. Three Gorham cyclists made the trip, including Alan Beagle, John Strout and Tony Esposito.

The bike group meets most weekends at GHS and rides 40 to 100 miles. "The number of riders each week varies from 4 to 14 depending on the weather and personal schedules," Beagle said. "Many of the cyclists also participate in an annual ride called Windham to the Whites."

The trek begins in Windham and

takes various routes to the Belgrade/ Lovell area (about 75 miles) on the first day followed by a ride of up to 120 miles to the White Mountains on the second day. On the third day, the group bikes back to Windham taking a route of about 90 miles.

With the group celebrating its 20th anniversary in 2013, the Narragansett Wheelmen decided to go big and take the trip to Italy for a week of riding. 12 cyclists including Beagle, Strout and Esposito traveled to Italy, staying at a bike hotel at the southern end of Lake Garda, a short distance from Verona.

Over the course of the seven-day trip, the group cycled approximately 450 miles including ascending a total of 50,000 feet through the mountain range. "We rented high-quality road bikes from the hotel, and on each day, we were led by a professional guide who took us through challenging routes

that included hairpin turns that present a challenge going up and down," Beagle said. "We also got to watch part of the famous Italian bike race, the Giro d'Italia, which is Italy's equivalent to the Tour de France."


Researchers Visit GMS with | Reading Across America High Tech Microscopes

Mrs. Gospodarek's seventh grade science class at Gorham Middle School received a special visit from two scientists from the Duboise Virology Lab at the University of Southern Maine. Dr. Naun Lobo and Miyad Movassaghi, who research viruses and microbes from environments with extreme pH, salinity and temperature, visited the science class to introduce and teach students about two microscopes.

The Florescent Microscope and Scanning Electron Microscope were new to students since they only have the ability to use Light Microscopes during class. This new microscopy was very complex, and had great detail. Students looked at how these microscopes worked by examining organisms under the magnitude. The Florescent Microscope used colors to show different parts of a cell, and the Scanning Electron Microscope used an electron gun to scan an object or organism to create a three-dimensional image.

"It was really cool that you could zoom in so far and still get a coher-

ent image on the Scanning Electron Microscope," stated Anna Slager.

Lobo and Movassaghi have opened students up to new types of microscopy, and inspired them to look further into the vast world of technology. All students had a wonderful time and enjoyed learning something new. They would like to thank Lobo and Movassaghi for the informative and fantastic day.

The microscopy outreach is funded through a Science Education Partnership Award, which is part of the National Institutes of Health.

Technology Workshop at Village School a Big Success

The demand on K-12 schools for technologically sophisticated teachers is great because technology holds the key to our future and they are preparing students for jobs that do not vet exist. It is the responsibility of administrators, teachers, and support staff to continuously improve upon their skills. Technology skills must be developed along with integration of technology to help students develop higher order skills and to function effectively in the world beyond the classroom. These acquired skills will help prepare students for jobs in the future.

To help further the professional development of teachers and support staff, Village and Narragansett schools joined together to attend a "Technology Workshop" at Village School to help broaden and expand their knowledge. The workshop was designed like a "science fair" with various booths set up around the room with a number of different presenters.

In this case, the presenters were our teachers. All of the material presented highlighted the rich and engaging activities that K-5 teachers incorporate in their everyday lessons to help prepare students for life in the twentyfirst century.

Some examples of the technology shared included creating digital portfolios; saving and sharing files with Dropbox: using Edmodo as a collaborative work space; using interactive whiteboard activities; teaching tips through the use of Pinterest; exploring iPad apps; and sharing various online Web 2.0 tools, just to name a few.

The teachers' reactions were overwhelmingly positive as a professional development experience. The "science fair" format itself allowed participants to pick and choose areas of interest. This was highlighted in comments from the post-workshop survey.

One teacher said, "I liked that we had a choice to work on areas that were of interest to us," while another said, "I enjoyed being able to browse the different tables.'

The excitement continues as teachers begin using many of the innovative ideas they learned and as they collaborate with fellow teachers to continue expanding their knowledge in this area.

Students in Jacqueline Durant-Harthorne's second grade classroom at Narragansett School create digital portfolios using a variety of multimedia technologies. The portfolio, which showcases the student's work over the course of the school year, is presented by the student at parentteacher conferences. "Technology is our now, not our future. It's the way kids communicate," said Durant-Harthorne.



GMS Alternative Ed. Programs Seeks Community **Service Based Projects**

Gorham Middle School has created an Alternative Education Program designed for students who are disengaged from traditional learning in school and may experience challenges with attendance, academic performance, behaviors, relationships with adults and peers, and motivation. The program focuses on skills needed to be successful in the real world. Students learn the same academic subjects as their middle school peers, yet much of their learning is personalized to the student or the group; delivered in integrat-

ed units; or takes place outside of the classroom, including community service opportunities, field trips, and outdoor educational activities both within the school and the community.

For the past two years, students from Gorham Middle School's Alternative Education Program have participated in a "learn to ski or snowboard" community-based learning experience. Funded through grants from Berlin City's Drive for Education initiative, students and their chaperones traveled to Shawnee Peak where they received a ski or snowboard lesson, and time to practice what they learned. While it sounds fun, this experiential lesson presented real-life

opportunities for students to learn about the district's Code of Conduct, develop life skills that included challenging themselves, working with others, and conflict resolution.

Some of the service-based learning projects have included building bridges for the Presumpscott Land Trust, interacting with residents at the Inn at Village Square, participating in agricultural lessons at Pineland Farms, learning navigational techniques through hiking, and visiting museums.

Now in its third year, the program accepts between ten to fifteen students in grades sixth, seventh, and eighth. Mrs. Whitaker, who has been instrumental in the success of the middle school's community garden, is looking for other community based service learning projects for her students. 
